## Churches Enter Fall Activities Sunday, Sept. 8

### Lutheran and Presbyterian Churches Resume Sessions After Period of Vacation.

Churches of La Grande will enter a busy autumn season of activities this coming week, with two of the churches resuming regular sessions following their summer vacations—the Presbyterian church and the Lutheran church. Two other churches have new pastors in the pulpits, secured during the last month, the Baptist and the South Methodist churches.

Announcements for Sunday services follow:

#### First Presbyterian Church

"Enter into the fall and winter season in the church we think kindly of the vacation we spent, and trust all have profited, so that now we will enter upon the activities with new zeal and earnestness," the Rev. J. George Wals, who has just returned from a vacation trip, declared today. He will occupy the pulpit at the Presbyterian church both at 11 a. m. and 8 p. m. The morning sermon text will be "Golden Moments in God's Hands" and the evening topic will be "True Righteousness Brings Persecution." Miss Gladys Miller will play the evening service, presenting the psalm "I have trusted in the Lord" and the song "I have trusted in the Lord." Mrs. H. N. Ashby will sing "The Ninety-first Psalm" by MacDermid. In the morning the quartet will sing "When Whitsun Comes" by How Jones. Sunday Bible school begins at 10:45 o'clock in the morning.

#### Lutheran Church

Services will be resumed in the Lutheran church Sunday morning. Bible school will convene at 9:45 a. m. and at 11 o'clock the pastor will speak. The subject will be "Waiting on the Lord" by Galois.

#### St. Peter's Episcopal Church

The church school will begin its fall program at 9:45 a. m. Sunday in St. Peter's Episcopal church. All teachers and pupils are urged to be in attendance. The church program for the year will be set before the organization in the message for the morning hour, beginning at 11 o'clock, "The Open Door." The Rev. M. G. Tompkinson, rector, is expecting a large congregation for this service.

#### Baptist Church

The subject for the September session in the Baptist church will be "The Sure Foundation" and in the evening, beginning at 7:30 o'clock, the Rev. R. Marcus Godwin, pastor, will speak on "Christ in the Flesh or Proof of the Foundation of the Scriptures."

## JONATHANS TO BRING \$1.65 A BOX, REPORT

YAKIMA, Sept. 4 (AP)—A minimum growers price of \$1.65 a box on Jonathan apples, extra fancy grade for seasonal delivery, has been recommended by the Yakima County Farm Bureau. Several of the members suggested \$1.75 but it was brought out that too high a price would keep down the consumption, and the export deal and interfere with the

marketing of Winesaps later in the year.

The outlook of Jonathan growers in the valley is seen as favorable by many, due, it was said, to a short crop in the Middle West Jonathan producing districts.

## One Mule Deer Limit Will Be Enforced Here

BAKER, Ore., Sept. 6—In reply to an inquiry from John Kuhns, supervisor of the Whitman national forest, Harold Clifford, state game warden, stated in a letter received here today that the game commission will enforce strictly the one mule deer limit, which was set at the last session of the state

legislature. Mr. Clifford's communication reads in part: "Regarding enforcement of the new law which provides for the killing of one mule deer, you will perhaps recall the discussion that took place at a meeting of the Baker Rod and Gun club shortly after the adjournment of the 1929 legislative session. In view of the fact that thousands of these deer had been sold before the law went into effect, it was deemed impossible, as well as too expensive a procedure to recall or substitute new licenses for the current year. Our policy will be to enforce strictly the one-mule deer limit, regardless of the fact that there are two tags on the hunting license. We will endeavor to impose the burden of proof upon the hunter as to species of deer killed. Before the hunting season opens

we hope to have out some authoritative information which will guide the hunters in distinguishing between the Columbia black-tail deer and the mule deer."

The deer season is scheduled to open September 15.

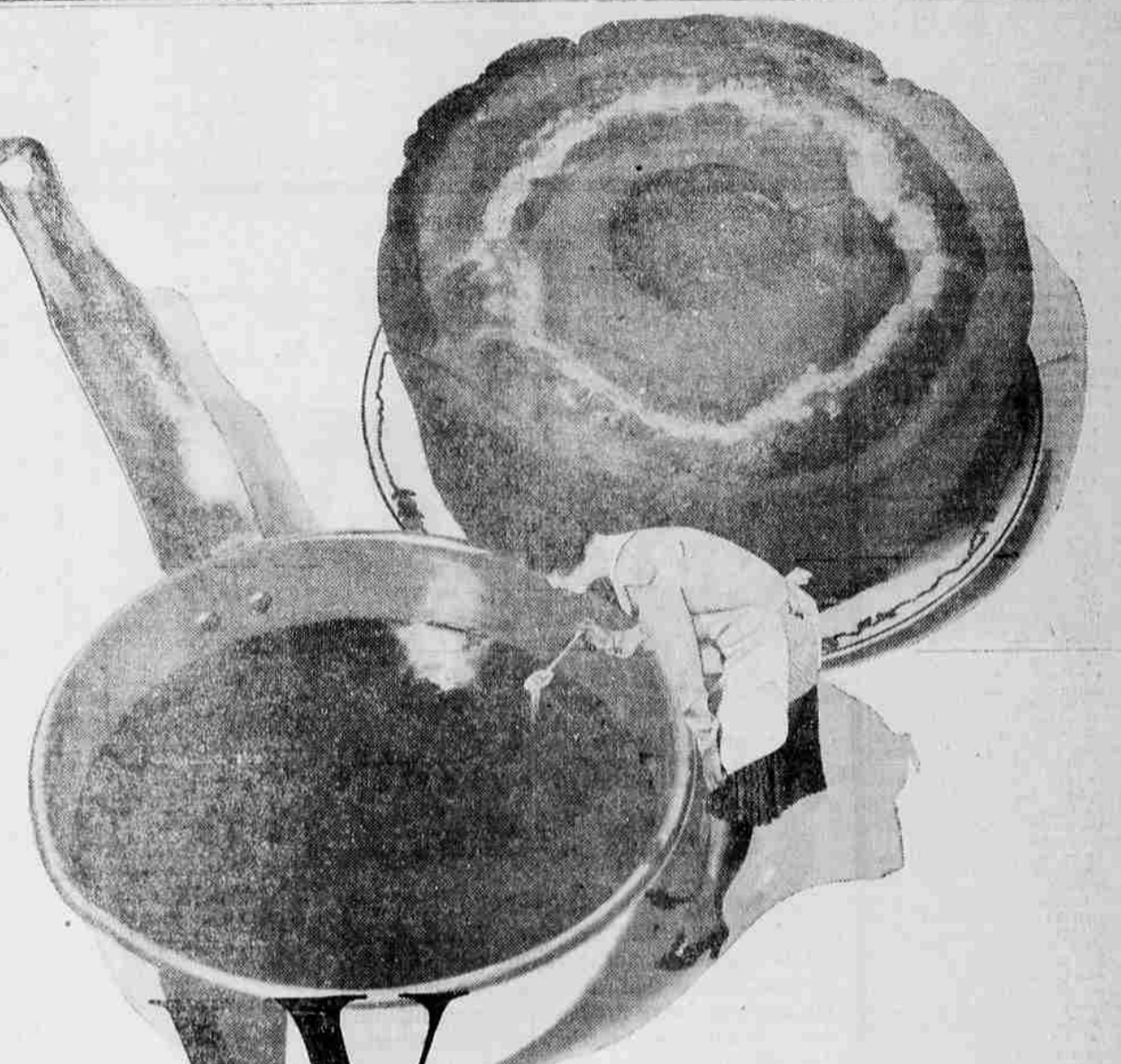
