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MENUS

By Miss Mary
The housekeeper who likes to put away her own fruits and vegetables for winter use will find them an excellent home-cured product.

One of the draws on the market will make the process much shorter and in a small investment, for other foodstuffs can be dried for winter use to good advantage. Dried foods are easily kept and have several points in their favor over canned foods. One cup of dried food will go almost twice as far as

for as one cup of the same thing. This means a saving in storage space. Dried fruits and vegetables keep without risk of spoilage.

A home made drier can be made to fit one's oven or the top of a coal range. Strong screening is stretched over the frame inside the required size and the whole is covered with cheesecloth. Small legs at each corner elevate it to the desired height. Three to four inches permit free circulation of air between the tray and the warm stove top or the oven bottom.

Blanch All Vegetables
All vegetables should be blanched before drying. This dipping into boiling water insures perfect cleanliness and induces even evaporation.

To dry corn, remove husks and silk as usual. Drop into boiling water and boil five minutes, longer enough to set the milk cut kernels from cob, taking care not to cut deep enough to cut the corn. Spread thinly and evenly on tray and dry from three to four hours at a temperature of about 125 degrees F. Stir constantly while drying. Let stand on trays until perfectly dry. Store in dust-proof containers in a dry place.

When wanted to cook, soak the corn for two to four hours in lukewarm water. Use two cups water to one cup corn and cook in the same water in which it was soaked. It will take about 45 minutes to cook the corn until tender. Season with butter, salt and pepper.
