CITY SCHOOL ENROLLMENT MONDAY 1931 (Continued from Page 1)

tween the public school system and the Normal. Certain selected classrooms will be used in which student teachers will observe the work of the regular public school teachers and at the proper time do responsible teaching under the direction of the Normal School faculty, and at other times, under the direction of the regular faculty of the public schools.

In order better to organize this plan of cooperation and at the same time to abandon the use of certain basement rooms for classroom purposes and to serve more directly the children living near the Normal School, an elementary public school consisting of grades 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14, has been established in four rooms on the first floor of the beautiful new building of the Eastern Oregon Normal School.

"This public school is conducted

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under the direction and control of the La Grande Board of Education. There is one teacher for each grade employed jointly by the Board of Education and the Normal School. Each teacher is specially well trained for the work of the grade she is to teach and in addition has had several years of successful teaching experience. Included also on the faculty of this new elementary school are two supervisors—one for lower grades and one for upper grades—whose duty it is to oversee and supervise the work of these specially trained teachers.

"The subjects taught in this school, the textbooks used, and the standards maintained will all be identical with those of the other schools of the La Grande system."

"All the various rules and regulations of the La Grande Board of Education concerning courses of

study, attendance, vacations, length of school day, conduct of pupils in and about the buildings, going to and from school, and on the playgrounds, will be carried out in the new school just as in the other schools of the system."

"All of the desirable qualities to be found in the other schools of the La Grande system will be found also in the new Training School. In addition, this new school will furnish greater opportunity for individual instruction, special help, and special attention, and there will also be available additional equipment and supplies which on account of expense can not be placed in the larger schools of the system. Such additional equipment and supplies will be furnished by the Normal School."

"The type of instruction to be carried on in the Training School will be identical with that in the other schools of the La Grande
