Weather Ideal For Harvesting In Wallowa Co.

WALLOWA, Ore., (Special)—Ideal harvest weather is still being experienced in this section of the country. Threshing of the late crops of the county is being done in many parts of the county at this time.

Particularly all the grain in the hill sections has been harvested and the threshing being done is now mostly on irrigated farms of the valley. A large part of the second cuttings of hay has been stacked and is of exceptionally fine quality as it has been cut and put up without being wet by any rains.

Some of the farmers in the hills have been busy recently getting their summer grain into storage for seed. Seedling has not started as early here this season as usual because of the dry weather and presence of large numbers of grasshoppers which it was feared would do much damage to the young grain where the soil was not sufficiently mature to bring it up.

Some of the farmers have also delayed their seedling operations, some waiting for rains to start the seeds so that some of them could be killed by cultivation before the grain was seeded. Much seed grain has been cleaned and suitably treated at many of the farms during the past week and a number of farmers say they expect to commence seedling the first of the coming week. The soil is still very dry in most fields and it is not expected that much of the grain will germinate until more rain falls.

The fire situation in this section is still quite serious. During the past week two fires were started on South mountain and according to reports from there burned over a considerable acreage of timber land before they were brought

under control. Residents of that community, together with the aid of several men from town, were busy for some time getting a strip shaved around the fire to prevent their spreading further. With the flames corralled in this manner and a few men left to watch, the fires have been held under control. The largest fire of the season occurred last week on the Ju-naha river and is thought to have been started by lightning. A crew of about 20 men was engaged in fighting fire at that point because of the fact that it spread over several hundred acres of land. Some of the local nimrods are in hopes rain will come soon to lessen the fire danger so that the hunting season will not be postponed again this season.

John Couch, of Leno, has been suffering from blood poisoning in one of his fingers during the past week.

L. W. Minor is the first farmer in this community to start seeding fall wheat. He has been busy during the past several days seeding a field of summer fallow.
