Interesting Trip—

"I really had a mighty fine trip," Dr. E. L. Trible reported today after returning last night from his three weeks course in the Palmer school of chiropractic at Davenport, Iowa. "Perhaps the most interesting thing I saw on my visit, in fact the largest thing I've seen in a long time, was the Graf Zeppelin," he continued. "The Zeppelin went through Davenport, and sailed over the school where Dr. Trible was standing on the tower. 'It was just about 1000 feet above the city; it was so close I could see into the windows of the cabin. Its length appeared to be about two city blocks long,' he doctor stated. Arriving in Denver, I found snow on the ground, and the temperature was 40 degrees above." The weather at Salt Lake City is just about the same as it is here, he reported. "There were 4000 chiropractors at the school, with every state in the Union represented. I also knew a student from Hawaii." Dr. W. A. Signs of Baker accompanied Dr. Trible to the Palmer review course that is held every year.

13 British Lines Said in Conspiracy

NEW YORK, Sept. 11 (AP)—Charges that 13 British steamship lines are in a conspiracy to deprive the United States Navigation company of trans-Atlantic freight business were on file in federal court today.

The American company is seeking an injunction against the British lines which include the Cunard and White Star lines, accusing them of numerous illegal practices and of being in combination to restrain American foreign trade.

LOUIS MARSHALL DIES

ZURICH, Switzerland, Sept. 11 (AP)—The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic agency here reported today that Louis Marshall, prominent Jewish philanthropist of New York City, died this afternoon of an affection of the pancreas. Mr. Marshall had been ill for several weeks and a blood transfusion was given him several days ago.

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 11 (AP)—Fighting his way out of the shade war defeat with indomitable courage, Henry Austin, English Davis cup star, gained a place among the quarter finalists for the national tennis singles championship today by defeating Ed Kelleman, former Harvard player, by scores of 2-6, 5-7, 6-2, 6-1, 6-2.

VIOLENT STORM

BADAJOS, Spain, Sept. 11 (AP)—A violent storm swept this province yesterday and last night, disrupting communication and causing several casualties. Lightning struck and burned several houses in the village of Mirandilla. Two middle-aged farmers were burned to death and five seriously injured. At Trujillo lightning killed two and injured four.

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Suspected Of Being Cow Thieves' Leader

YREKA, Cal., Sept. 10 (AP)—C. D. Reaser, 74, suspected of being the ringleader of a group of cattle rustlers, today was held for trial in superior court on a charge of grand theft.

Four men arrested with Reaser, including his son George, Lyn Lazavater, a newspaper owner of Cosmopolis, Wash., W. K. Wren, and C. D. Reaser, were dismissed by Justice of the Peace Clifford Butler at "unintentional accomplices" when they satisfied the court that they were not present when a steer owned by Albert Hegler of Walker, was killed and they believed the farmer had been compensated for his animal.

Accuse Ohio State Of Grid Offense

CLEVELAND, Sept. 11 (AP)—Ralph Vince, coach at John Carroll university today charged that Ohio State university offered free room, board, tuition and a job to Red Rosequist if he would relinquish his position as star tackle on the Carroll team and play on the Ohio State squad.

Vince said Rosequist told him that he had been approached by Hal Ellis of Toledo, Ohio state senior, employe at the state examiner's office at Columbus.
