NO PAVEMENT
TO BE BUILT
ON K AVENUE

Property Owners Officially "Kill" Project Last Night.

FAVORS EIGHTH
STREET APPROACH

Hartenbower Brothers Given Contract in Amount of \$4,356.26 for Ninth Street Work.

The paved approach to the Eastern Oregon normal school from the west will not go up K avenue. That was automatically decided for the city commission last night when the group resumed consideration of the hearing of improvement district No. 185. A remonstrance, signed by approximately three-fourths of the property owners in the district, was officially recognized and this formally and definitely "killed" the K avenue pavement proposal.

The hearing was scheduled for last Wednesday night but it was adjourned a week at the request of the chamber of commerce. Last night A. W. Nelson, president of the chamber, reported that efforts of the organization to open the way for pavement on K avenue met with absolutely no success.

Favor Eighth Street
Incidentally, Mr. Nelson reported that his committee has been approached by numerous local citizens, both inside and outside of the proposed K avenue district, with the question: "Why don't you come up Eighth street?"

Present indications are that the west paved entrance to the Eastern Oregon normal school will go up Eighth street to the K avenue intersection, but engineers are of the opinion that it will be impossible to pave this street this fall, but that a grade may be established with a gravel surface and that the school's fair entrance until 1930, when paving would be possible.

Let Ninth Street Contract
The paved entrance to the school from the north was definitely assured last night when a contract in the amount of \$4,356.26 was awarded to Hartenbower Brothers for the paving of Ninth street to the normal school. This project represents one block of pavement plus the intersection, and a part of this latter work will be done on force account, it is said.

Three bids were received for the Ninth street paving, but of the three, only Hartenbower's offer was below the estimate of \$4,356.26. The Northwest Road & Construction Co. bid \$4,464.82 and P. J. Lally bid \$4,533.62.

With the contract let, work is expected to start on this project within the month.

Sidewalk Contracts Let
Two sidewalk improvement district contracts also were let last night, both to P. J. Lally. Mr. Lally bid \$764 on district 152, which includes K avenue, and \$1,032.40 on district 154, which includes Jackson avenue and Pine street. The estimate for 152 was \$769 and for 154 \$1,036. Hartenbower brothers bid \$711 on 152 and \$1,137.60 on 154, both bids being above the estimate.

Two improvement districts, No. 156 and 157, both for sidewalks, were up for hearing and the city recorder was authorized to accept bids for the third and final time on Sept. 25.

Bills for the month of August in the amount of \$2,241.91 were ordered paid. Two ordinances vacating streets and alleys were read for the third and final time and

Most results of the local "Lock Your Car" campaign were announced today by City Traffic Officer Claude Cooper. CANADIAN CROP SMALL

TO INSTALL
NEW MACHINE
AT AIRPORT

Automatic "Printer" to be Used for Given out Weather Reports.

TO BE READY FOR
THROUGH AIRMAIL

Four Planes to Pass Over La Grande Each Night—Will Stop Here During Winter.

With the Portland to Salt Lake City airmail service scheduled to start Sept. 15 with night flying, arrangements are being made here today for the installation of automatic teletype machines at the local airport for the relaying of weather reports. It was announced today by Harold O'Connell, local manager. He received his information yesterday from Leon Cuddeback, vice president and chief pilot of the Varny Air line.

The teletype machines will be similar to those in the Observer office which carry the Associated Press news report. Mr. O'Connell will receive weather reports from about 15 stations between Pasco and Boise by telephone, and then file the reports on the machine to either Pasco or Boise, whichever place the airmail is taking off from. This work will be done practically all night.

Four Planes Each Night
The present plans call for four planes over La Grande each evening, one at dusk, two about midnight and another at dawn. Practice flights have been made since the first of the month and the formal opening of the service is scheduled for Sunday.

Varny officials also announced that in a couple of months the La Grande airport will be open to regular stops by the airmail planes. This will not be for the purpose of taking on mail, but will be made necessary because of late fall and winter flying conditions. Last year

Speak at L. H. S.
Assembly Today

Oregon Institutions Have Everything to Offer, Local Students Are Assured.

Three men from the University of Oregon who are traveling to various high schools in the state urging Oregon students to attend state institutions, spoke in an assembly this morning at the high school.

Tom Stoddard, president of the U. of O. student body, was the first of the three to speak. He was introduced by E. D. Towler, principal.

The subject of his talk was "The Value of College Education in Gained From one of our State Institutions." In this talk he pointed out that there is no course in Oregon that cannot be obtained from Oregon institutions and these courses are of the highest rating.

The student body president reminded, telling of the days when he attended school in La Grande and of some of his high school experiences.

Keith Hall Speaks
Keith Hall, assistant chairman of the greater Oregon committee, next informed the student body about the "Collegiate Side of College." His talk was very interesting and peppy. The student body heard about a four-year college course, and about school and campus activities.

Paul Hunt, chairman of the Greater Oregon committee, related to the students about the difference between schools and of many of the curricula in the courses at the university. STATE PRISON

On May 29, Finke confronted Beebe, a high school student, in the corridor of Jefferson high school here, fired three shots into his body and then turned the revolver on himself. For several days Finke's own life hung by a thread.

"Tin Bubble" Is
Turned Over To
Navy Department

LAKEHURST, N. J., Sept. 12 (AP)—The metal dirigible M-2 being delivered to the navy department from Detroit, arrived shortly before noon today with a bubble in its main helium gas chamber.

Captain William Kepner, of the army, who flew the ship from Detroit, was unaware that he had been shot at until the ship was safely in the hangar and the bubble hole was discovered by a member of the landing crew.

The bubble was immediately plugged with tape to prevent further loss of the valuable helium until permanent repairs would be made.

ARREST THREE
POLICEMEN IN
L. A. SCANDAL

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12 (AP)—Two police sergeants and a patrolman were under arrest today, charged with the L. A. scandal, including John Doe complaints, still were to be served and a thirteenth warrant was being withheld temporarily in the Los Angeles grand jury clean up of alleged police bootleg graft.

MUSSOLINI GIVES
UP EIGHT POSTS

Il Duce Remains Premier and Minister of Interior of Italy.

ROME, Sept. 12 (AP)—Benito Mussolini, Italian dictator, today relinquished seven of the eight cabinet posts he holds in the Italian Fascist government. He remains premier and minister of the interior.

A royal decree, announcing the action, also contained the notice of replacement of two other ministers, those of public instruction and of national economy.

The undersecretary for the interior ministry, which portfolio the Duce retained, also was changed in the move, which comprised probably the most sweeping reorganization of the Fascist government since its inception.

The new ministers will take oath before King Victor Emmanuel Monday.

In explanation, the suggestion was made in some quarters that the premier had held eight of the thirteen posts in the Italian cabinet for so long only because he wished to become acquainted with the various departments of administration in order to select the best fitted men to put at their head.

His procedure in keeping the portfolio of interior is that which was customary in cabinets before the advent of fascism. Aside from the premiership the portfolio is considered probably the cabinet's most important post.

Among the new appointments the most noteworthy was that of Undersecretary Rino Grandi to become foreign minister. This appointment was accepted as removing the likelihood of his becoming an ambassador to some important capital, possibly Washington. There had been reports in this effect recently.

Chinese Arrest Soviet Citizens
HARBIN, Manchuria, Sept. 12 (AP)—Chinese Manchurian authorities during the 48 hours end at midnight, arrested and detained 300 more Soviet Russian citizens, all were interned.

Reports from the front continue conflicting, with official dispatches stating the Soviet troops abandoned Chailanor and Pogranichaya September 9, although other airplanes continued to fly over the border cities and as far inland as Mulin.

It was said the Soviet flyers dropped leaflets over Pogranichaya, saying, "We won't bombard you again, thanks to your blood and soil," which is a popular Russian saying equivalent to "Thanks to your hospitality."

Soviet Airplane Continues Flight
MUKDEN, Manchuria, Sept. 12 (AP)—A Chinese official communication today stated fighting was resumed this morning at Pogranichaya, center of military of the Chinese Eastern railway. Russian forces were repulsed, it was stated.

Enright Candidate In Mayoralty Fight
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Sub-Committee
To Investigate
Shearer's Case

Open Hearings to Begin Probably on Monday—Hoover and Congress Order Inquiry.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—A sub-committee of three members, headed by Senator Shortridge, Republican, California, was appointed today by the senate naval committee to inquire into the activities of American shipbuilding corporations at the unsuccessful 1927 Geneva naval limitations conference. Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, and Senator Allen, of Kansas, are the other members.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—The senate naval committee today turned over its inquiry into the activities of American shipbuilding corporations at the Geneva naval limitations conference of 1927 to a sub-committee which is to conduct open hearings beginning probably on Monday.

Ready to carry out the expressed desire of President Hoover that charges of interference by large American shipbuilding corporations at the unsuccessful Geneva disarmament conference of 1927 be sifted "to the very bottom," the senate naval committee today devoted itself to formulating plans for its forthcoming investigation to determine what witnesses shall be heard and what procedure followed. An executive session of the committee was ordered by its chairman, Senator Hale, of Maine.

Shearer to Testify
It was expected that the first witness to be called by the senate committee would be William R. Shearer, self-styled naval expert, who attended the Geneva conference as the agent of the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation, the New York Shipbuilding company (subsidiary of the American Brown Boveri Electric corporation) and the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock company.

Claiming unpaid compensation of more than \$250,000 for his services, Shearer was arrested by the navy.

Police Arrest
60 Doukhobors
In Nude Parade

CANORA, Sask., Sept. 12 (AP)—Three score men and women Doukhobors were under jail sentence today for holding another nude parade. Thirty-seven children among the children welfare bureau. The nude parade was staged yesterday and was the first since that two weeks ago for which 193 Doukhobors were sentenced to six months in jail from Nelson, B. C. Those sentenced for yesterday's parade are to serve six months at Prince Albert jail. The charges were indecent exposure. They are members of the Sons of Freedom, an outcast branch of the sect.

The demonstration yesterday was made after the arrest of eight leaders of the sect at Mildred, Sask. Women and children appeared without clothing and even attempted to disrobe but were prevented by the arrival of Royal Canadian police, armed with riding whips.

Those under arrest are part of the 250 who a week ago engaged in a battle with police when they attempted to enter Kamusk. Since the episode when they stormed a bridge at the edge of the town they have been wandering about the highway, sleeping at the roadside at night.

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FIRES STILL
BLAZING IN
WEST OREGON

Rock Creek Fire Near Marshfield Not Yet Under Control.

TWO NEW FIRES
IN THE SISKIYOU

Groups of Ranch Buildings in Lane County Destroyed—No Loss of Life Reported.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 12 (AP)—Already having swept over 2500 acres of valuable fir and cedar timber, the Rock Creek fire in Canas valley between Marshfield and Roseburg was today still out of control. More than 400 men were on the fire line retreating before the raging flames.

All other fires in that district were reported under control today. Fire wardens declare rain appears to be the only hope of checking the Rock Creek conflagration.

Conditions in the Siskiyou national forest were regarded as alarming today with a one thousand-acre fire burning in the Waldport area.

Phone Poles Burned
Telephone communication with fire lines has been severed in many instances by the burning of poles carrying the wires. Three or four groups of ranch buildings in Lane county have been destroyed by the flames. Reports from the fire fighters yesterday described these groups of buildings as "settlements."

As far as is known there has been no loss of life. Cecil Hickey, mill worker, was in a Eugene hospital today with a fractured skull suffered when a pile of lumber fell on him as he was aiding in efforts to save a mill at Oren from destruction.

Two serious fires were said to have broken out yesterday in the Siskiyou national forest. One was in Coos county and the other in Curry.

The only new fire in Washington was on a ridge on the upper Lewis river in the Columbia national forest. The Dole fire was said to be burning fiercely in this upper Little Washington district.

SITUATION ENCOURAGING
FIRE LINES ON MOST OF THE LANE COUNTY FRONT BEING HELD BY GREAT CROWDS OF MEN BATTLING FOREST FLAMES TODAY.

Wardens said the situation was encouraging and no new cases of farm buildings having been destroyed were known.

Communication in parts of the county was disrupted and roads blocked by falling timber. Two bridges on the Swiss Home-Lincoln road were burned out.

INFORMER, 18,
AROUSES IRE
OF U. S. JUDGE

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept. 12 (AP)—Testimony of an eighteen year old informer that he purchased liquor and drank it in an alley to get evidence has aroused the ire of Federal Judge Harry H. Anderson and he denounced the incident as a "disgrace."

Hadley Strange was testifying against Harry Lengley and Elmer Robb, charged with selling liquor. He said he and six men bought liquor at an inn here and drank it at a table in an alley way.

The judge asked his age and upon learning it, addressed the court room:

"It is a shame for the United States government to hire boys like this and send them into alleys to drink whiskey with bums. It is a disgrace."
