and down the aisles while we waited for the Pope. Everything in Italy is heavily guarded.

"London is a metropolitan city, like America, only the accent in their language is very queer. Britishers seemed to be amused at our pronunciation," she laughingly said. "We watched the elite in London promenading in Hyde park; even small boys of fourteen are seen wearing swallow tail coats, gray striped pants, spats, and carrying a cane.

"Like Venice, there is only one Paris. It is a city of night life. At twelve in the evening people are around on the streets as if it were only seven.

"I went on the battlefield trip out of Paris, and saw quite a bit of France. It is a wooded country, with every available spot cultivated. The trenches are grown over with weeds; they are not cultivated because of so many buried explosives. The German graves are marked with black crosses, and the others with white.

"One place in Paris, the Monte Martre, was very Bohemian. There were tables under the trees, where artists with long hair and all types of Frenchmen sipped their wines, while an orchestra played weird tunes.

"We had an interview with an artist from Northern Europe, who autographed a slip of paper for us, and quickly drew a sketch of himself.
