

Hope Abandoned For Missing Ship And Crew of 28

CHICAGO, Sept. 12 (AP)—Hope was all but abandoned today for the missing gravel ship Andaste and its crew of 28. Coast guardmen returning from a search for the vessel, three days overdue in Chicago from Grand Haven, Mich., said neither Lake Michigan nor the Michigan shore had given a single clue to the ship's fate.

The Andaste, loaded with gravel for the Construction Materials company, would have sunk quickly if its steel plates sprang a leak in midlake, members of the South Chicago coast guard said today. The coast guardmen had just returned from a search which extended along the shore between Grand Haven and Chicago. No sign of wreckage was found.

Because of its load and its steel construction, the guardmen said the boat would have gone down with little chance for Capt. Albert Anderson or any members of the crew to escape.

Capt. Anderson has sailed the lakes for 45 years and during 20 years of that time has held a master's license.

AUTHORITIES SEARCHING FOR MISSING GIRL

TUCSON, Ariz., Sept. 13 (AP)—Federal authorities, Tucson police and Pima county sheriff's deputies today were searching the desert north of here for Mae Bundy, missing witness in a Mann act violation case. Her departure was discovered when an automobile, subsequently identified as the property of E. Rowell, of Kansas City, was found abandoned nine miles from here, near Hards Road. Investigators could find no tracks indicating how or in what direction she had left the car.

A note pinned to the steering wheel of the machine instructed finders to notify Rowell, the writer indicating that it was Mrs. Rowell who had left it. Telegraphic queries directed to Rowell in Kansas City, however, brought the explanation from him that the car, although 1918, had been loaned to Mae Bundy, who had been in Tucson for her health.

Also, in the front seat of the machine investigators found a woman's glove, an empty pistol holster, a pair of glasses, a pencil, and a pair of garters. Preliminary search revealed no trace of the woman.

Engineer Killed By Boiler Explosion

DUNSMITH, Cal., Sept. 13 (AP)—T. R. Bateman, Ashland, Ore., Southern Pacific railroad engineer, was fatally injured last night when the boiler of his locomotive exploded seven miles east of Dunsmuir, in the Shasta train mountains.

The blast occurred while the train of forty-nine freight cars to which Bateman's engine was attached was ascending a steep grade. Three other engines were attached to the train, but they were undamaged.

Is your child undernourished?

Surprising results disclosed by New York survey

A survey of one million school children conducted by the Department of Health of the city of New York, disclosed that 20% of the children were seriously undernourished and in need of a physician's care. More than 60% were reported "on the border line" of malnutrition. Only a trifle more than 17% were found to be normal. This survey was not limited to the so-called poorer classes. It was representative of the entire city. It indicated that four children out of every five are in immediate need of a more carefully selected diet.

Mothers should see that their children eat sufficiently of milk, fruit and vegetable foods. The important step is to make these foods so enjoyable that children will eat them.

Authorities recommend a little sugar used judiciously to assist mothers in making foods appetizing. A small sprinkling of sugar on cereals, as one eminent food scientist phrases it, takes the "bite" out of eating cereal. Citrous and other fresh fruits, berries, stewed fruits, are made more appetizing by a dash of sugar. Wise mothers make junkets, blanc-mange, custards, and other milk desserts to encourage the eating of milk.

Note this: If you want to improve the taste of healthful vegetables just add a dash of sugar to them while they are cooking (preferably in little water). Try it and you will be amazed how much more tasteful the vegetables become. Candy, ice cream and cookies are recommended for dessert. A bit of sweet makes the meal complete. The Sugar Institute.

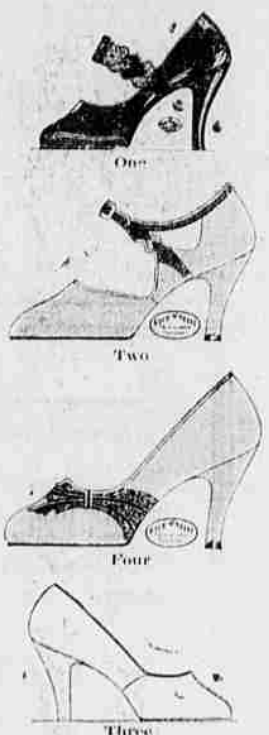
