## Mason To Lead University Grid Team This Year

EDUCATED, sport, 15-foot-182 regulars will be eligible for backfield duty—John Kitzmiller, the "Flying Dutchman," Bobby Robinson, Chuck Williams, and Captain Dave Mason, Kibritler, leading conference scorer last year, and Robinson will alternate at quarter, with Holbrook Watts, who played part of last season for the frosh before being forced out with injuries, as another possibility.

Bostles Mason, and Williams, John Donohue, letterman, who played both guard and half last year; and Wallace Shearer and Francis Hill of the super-variety, will be eligible for more competition, while the freshman team will offer Al Brown and Raymond Neuman, Shearer, Hill and Neuman are extremely light, while Brown and Donohue scale over 150 pounds each.

Coch McEwan will have three fullback possibilities, Harold Hatton, 180 pounds; Ridgeway Johnston, 150 pounds; and Ed Mosler, 200 pounds. Hatton played halfback two years ago but was out of school last season. Johnston had little varsity experience, joining the team late in the season last year, while Mosler was the star fullback two years ago. Incidentally, Mosler is the same lad who in a track meet with Washington last spring broke the world's 400m record.

Because of the uncertainty of the fullbacks, McEwan may play both Robinson and Kibritler at the same time, making one or the other the fullback.
