Peaches Scarcer With Price Firm In Oregon Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 16 (AP)—Hundreds of producers from many miles around brought fruits and vegetables to the two Union avenue markets of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association today. Tomatoes, corn, potatoes, cabbage and the bunch varieties were abundant.

Peaches were scarcer than last week, since much of the stock is going to the cannery. However, two loads found ready sale at \$1.19 and \$1.16.

WHEAT TSLUMPS THREE CENTS IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Sept. 16 (AP)—With further rain reported as falling in Argentina, wheat prices here averaged lower today in the early dealings. It was reported in some quarters that with average weather hereafter during September, October and November, Argentina might harvest a fair sized crop, despite drought damage. Opening 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 lower, the Chicago wheat market rallied somewhat but then underwent a fresh downturn. Corn and oats were also easy, corn starting 1/4 to 1/2 off, but subsequently recovering. Provisions tended upward.

Wheat closed nervous, 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 a bushel below Saturday's finish. Corn closed 1/2 to 1/4 down. Oats 1/4 to 1/2 off and provisions varying from the decline to a rise of 1/16.

GRAIN MARKETS CONTINUE FIRM

Wheat Advances During
The Week Just Ended;
Oats and Barley Higher

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—Grain markets continued firm during the week ending September 14, influenced by the September official estimates of reduced crops in North America and reports of continued unfavorable weather in the southern hemisphere, according to the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics. Wheat advanced 1/4 cent per bushel under a good domestic demand for the limited offerings. Corn held steady reflecting the small stocks and prospective short crops. Oats and barley prices continued their upward trend, while flax made a further sharp advance of around 1/2 cent per bushel. Rye was steady with wheat.

Weather and crop conditions in the southern hemisphere appeared to be the dominating factor in the wheat market during the week. The drought was reported broken by local showers in the northern part of the wheat belt, but crop conditions for both wheat and flax continued unfavorable and trade reports suggested a materially reduced wheat crop this season. It is too early however, to definitely determine the outcome, as it is still about three months until harvest and favorable weather might materially improve prospects.

The September official estimates for the United States and Canada confirm a reduction of about 20,000,000 bushels in the North American wheat crop. This decrease however, is practically offset by an increase of about 145,000,000 bushels in the European crop from the old crop. Including the total stocks within 245,000,000 bushels of last year's record supplies. There were no important changes during the week in European crop conditions. Production in the principal European countries as reported to date was around 27,000,000 bushels short of last season's harvest. This is more than offset, however, by increase in North Africa and India, so that the northern hemisphere harvest from present indications will be about 75,000,000 bushels below that of last season with about 145,000,000 bushels of this decrease offset by a larger carry-over of wheat from the 1928 crop.

Cash domestic wheat markets followed the advance in future prices and were 2 to 2 1/2 cent higher at the close of the market Sept. 12 than a week ago. Local mills were the principal buyers of hard winter wheat with export inquiry still of small volume. The market movement at varying wheat during the week was only about half as large as for the same period a year ago, and was partially responsible for a further advance in spring wheat prices. A sound wheat was in active demand from local mills.
