CONSTITUTION DAY

This is the one hundred and forty-second anniversary of the constitution of the United States. On September 17, 1787, the convention presided over by George Washington for four months completed its labors. The constitution which the convention reported to congress was the same in form, with the exception of the amendments that we have today. And this is of highest significance. No vital change in the fundamental law has been made in the more than a century and a third of its existence.

The frame of government which the constitution created is endowed with certain limited powers and from it the basic law withholds all powers not so granted. Every law enacted under authority of the constitution must conform to this supreme law; so conforming it becomes the law of the whole land. Necessarily there must be an interpretive power; interpreting the constitution and passing on the validity of legislation is the function of the supreme court.

Our country is singularly blessed in the quality of its constitution. The great instrument has successfully met every test to which it has been subjected. Its function is to protect the right of the states and individuals, thereby promoting the general welfare. Holding congress rigidly within its legitimate sphere of action, as the supreme court does in determining the validity of legislation, the constitution is the very backbone of our democratic system of government designed to secure all proper liberties and prevent oppression.

SCIENCE AND ECONOMY

From a notable American chemist comes the amazing statement that science can produce a synthetic substitute for anything and everything. Steel, rubber, beef-steak, milk, foods of all kinds, tin, gasoline, camphor—these and other things can be produced completely in the laboratory when and if the need arises.

For some time to come nature will be able to produce these things far more cheaply than man, but according to this and other scientists, if for any reason the cost of natural production should become excessive or the supply become exhausted, the world need not worry over where it will obtain suitable substitutes.

Again science silences the calamity-howlers. For years the public has been warned repeatedly that it was approaching a terrible age in which with raw materials exhausted, humanity would have to face a struggle for existence far more harrowing than that of prehistoric man. Here, however, is another viewpoint. There is no need to worry, for science can produce even what always has been considered the fundamentals.

This does not mean that the world is justified in squandering its raw materials. It means only that once basic stocks are diminished to the point that their cost rises above a certain level, science can produce a synthetic substitute. Conservation of natural resources should be continued and encouraged, for so long as they last the world will be assured of a less expensive product than that which would have to be produced synthetically.

In the meantime, chemistry stands as a safety valve over monopoly. Once the monopolist raises the price of his natural product above a certain point he invites the manufacture of a synthetic substitute. Science comes into the daily lives of all, and will become increasingly important as the years go by.

Huge Arena Takes Farm Show



The new St. Louis Arena, costing \$2,000,000, is to be opened Oct. 1 with three shows: the National Dairy Show, the National Poultry Show and the St. Louis Horse Show. This building, the idea of George H. Holcombe, is oval in shape, 475 feet long, 275 feet wide and at its highest point is 135 feet. Two wings, one on each side, add considerable floor space to the building, which is said to be adequate for any agricultural exhibition or political convention in the country. It seats 21,000 persons.

U. S. GIVES 1930 WHEAT OUTLOOK

Warns Producers Not to Expect Short World Crop in Coming Year.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 17.—The United States department of agriculture, bureau of agricultural economics, in its outlook for winter wheat in 1930, has the following to say:

"Producers of winter wheat should not plan their 1930 production with the expectation that wheat crops in foreign countries will be so short as to provide a market for their wheat equal to that of the present season. Should farmers carry out their expressed intentions this fall to seed a wheat acreage 1.2 per cent greater than they seeded last fall, with average abundance and average yields, production would continue to be well above domestic requirements and the 1930 winter wheat crop would have to be marketed upon an export basis. With normal or average yields in Canada, Argentina, and Australia, producers must count upon keen competition in world markets.

"With average abundance and average yields, the 43,271,000 acres of winter wheat which farmers report intentions to sow this fall, would produce a crop of about 567,000,000 bushels. In the last six years the average actually sown has averaged about 44 per cent below reported intentions. A continuation through September of the unusual drought now prevailing wheat, both in the United States and abroad, would reduce plantings by more than the usual amount, especially in the Central and Eastern parts of the belt, while with favorable weather, fall sowings may equal or exceed the intended acreage.

"The world market for wheat of the 1930 crop probably will be no better and may not be as good as that for the present season. Yields of spring wheat in the United States and Canada this year, have been very low and prospects now are that yields in Argentina and Australia will also be lower than usual. Farmers should not depend upon similarly reduced yields next year keeping down the world wheat crop. The world's carry-over into July, 1930, is expected to be considerably smaller than the carry-over into the present market season. The greatest reduction will be made in the carry-over in the

United States. The reduced carry-over will help to offset the increase in world production which would result if yields in 1930 should be average. The reduction in carry-over, however, is not likely to be sufficient to offset the increase in world production, and consequently the average world market prices for the 1930-1931 marketing season probably will not equal the average of prices realized for the 1929 crop.

Competition to Be Keen

"Looking further ahead, United States farmers must expect to meet continued keen competition in export markets from Canada, Australia and Argentina. Furthermore, there is a possibility that Russia may again be a factor in the world market in a few years. In view of the general tendency for expansion of acreage in the principal exporting countries, it seems very doubtful if prices of wheat in world markets during the next few years will average much above the levels of the past six years, unless unfavorable conditions should result in a series of unusually low yields."

Storms Delay Red Army Fliers Today

NIKOLAYEVSK-ON-AMUR, Siberia, Sept. 17 (AP)—Cyclones and typhoons over the Great Sea of Okhotsk have delayed Commander Sergey Stenakow and three other aces of the Red Army aviation corps on their departure for Kamchatka, next spot in their Moscow-New York flight.

Eighteen all-Soviet-constructed airplanes called "Land of the Soviets" the four Russian aviators completed in good time and without accident the first part of their flight, the crossing of Siberia.

CREW OF 200 BATTLE WAY TO SAFETY

abandoned their homes and went to Estacada. Others remained to fight the flames only to see their houses reduced to smoldering ashes.

Children either perched themselves atop their houses with water buckets to watch advancing flames or recovered their school books from desks hurriedly removed from the burning school building. Livestock were herded into corrals preparatory to a swift removal to places of safety.

Forest Trails Blocked

Somewhere to the east of fire line in what apparently had been a raging inferno Sunday night when a strong fire whipped it into fury, the 200 fire fighters, headed by T. H. Sherrard, supervisor of the Mount Hood national forest, were either fighting new blazes or herding their way back to civilization.

Forest trails were blocked by falling, smoldering trees, roads which penetrated the district, were strewn with ashes as much deep as six inches and great trees which went down under the fury of the flames.

Special couriers, sent out from the Pacific northwest district fire office here, secured the territory in search of the party. Officials said they believed the men were safe, though they indicated some consideration for repeated inquiries for them.

Terrible heat from the wind-fanned flames which threatened Estacada yesterday sent Roy Van Orman, a fire fighter, to a hospital here, saying, "I was physically exhausted."

Logging Camp Burns

In a space of one hour the logging camp of the La Taw Logging company burned leaving 25 men, women and children stranded. By two and three they fought their way through tangled underbrush to the safety of Estacada.

Fire consumed by the raging flames. Dozens of axes, hand pumps and buckets melted as if thrown in the flame of a torch. The same blaze destroyed the \$20,000 log La Taw hotel, one time prominent Cascade summer resort.

Portland and Cross officials last night were in Estacada surveying the damage and rounding up stragglers made homeless.

Officials said that if a wind did not come up, the situation probably would be controlled before daylight.
