BALLOON CONTEST
BEGINS SEPT. 28

Ten to Soard Away From
St. Louis in Quest of Gordon Bennett Trophy.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Ten balloons, representing the United States, France, Germany, Belgium, Denmark and the Argentine, will soar away from St. Louis September 28 in quest of the international Gordon Bennett Trophy.
It will be the eighteenth of the international balloon races and the third to start from St. Louis. Seven of the races have been won by the United States and five by Belgium, which gained permanent possession of the original Gordon Bennett trophy with its third straight victory in 1924.

The United States became permanent possessor of the second trophy with victories in 1926, '27 and '28.
Now the third of the Gordon Bennett trophies is up, with three American airmen seeking to gain the first leg on it.

Capt. W. H. Karpner, pilot, and Lieut. W. O. Epperson, aide, of the army air corps; Lieut. Thomas G. W. Settle, pilot, and Ensign Wilfred Bushnell, aide, of the navy, and Ward T. Van Orman, veteran civilian balloonist and an aide, are the American entrants.

Against them will be pitted the lone Belgian entry, Ernest Demuyter, who is seeking his fifth international victory. Demuyter is the only balloonist to have won the Gordon Bennett race more than once and his string of three victories in 1922, '23 and '24 won permanent possession of the first trophy for Belgium.

France has two entries, Germany also has two, and Denmark and the Argentine each have one.
Because St. Louis is in the central part of the country, new distance records for balloons are expected. The present record is 1,234 miles, made in 1912 by M. Hénard of France, who soared from Stuttgart, Germany, to Moscow, Russia, in 46 hours.

It is likely the balloons will sail to the eastward from St. Louis or at least land to the eastward. Ninety-five per cent of the balloon flights in this country, the aerial section of the army and navy reports, land to the eastward of their starting point because the prevailing winds in the higher altitudes are westerly.

Lieutenant Settle and Van Orman were their places in the international event in the 1925 national elimination race. Inspired Van Orman to invent a lightning arrester device with which his balloon will be equipped in the Gordon Bennett event.

The heat. Both Crestella were burned but not seriously.
Reports from Santa Paula say several thousand yards of high ways have been damaged, due to oil seepage, and an 11,000 barrel oil tank exploded, rolling flames down toward Santa Paula canyon. Residents in Santa Paula canyon were ordered to evacuate their homes by the Santa Paula chief of police, but, unless the wind turned against them, fire wardens believed it would be possible to save most of the threatened homesites in that section.

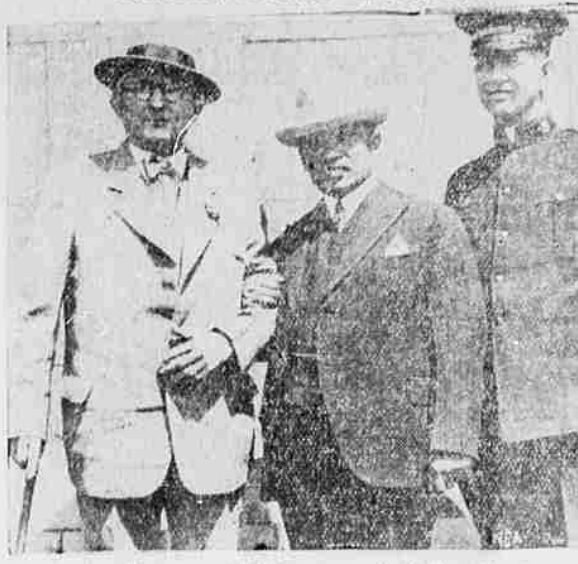
The fire started in Shave canyon two miles back high tension wire near the L. L. Dobson mansion. The wind carried the flames away from the mansion.
United States Forester Sam T. Primmer directed a battle of 200 men from a government airplane, in which he circled continuously over the burning district while the fire was at its height. Eggs and Butter
Higher; Italian
Prunes Weaker

PORTLAND, Sept. 17 (AP)—Both eggs and butter were higher at the Portland produce exchange today.

All grades of butter, except firsts, and all grades of eggs, except pullets, were advanced one cent.
The advances were in reflection of higher prices asked at all other coast markets.

California grapes were cheaper, at 75c to \$1.00 per lug of autohulls, \$1.00 to \$1.25 for Thompson seedless, and \$1.50 to \$2.00 for the other table varieties.

Italian prunes were weaker at 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 per 10 lb. box.
Large supplies of local lettuce caused depression of that market. Seattle and California stock moving to retailers slowly, mostly around \$3.25 per crate of 4 and 5 dozen boxes.

Good cauliflower is scarce, moving readily at \$1.50 per crate. Much cauliflower of ordinary quality is selling at \$1.00 to \$1.25. It is feared that the local cauliflower crop will be nearly a complete loss, if rainfall does not materialize soon.

Potatoes were firm, at \$3.00 per c. w. t. of No. 1 Yukon golds. East Side market prices were on a level with those quoted Monday.

Church And State
In Minor Dispute

ROME, Sept. 17 (AP)—Youth seem likely to be the cause of a minor dispute between church and state in Italy.

Pope Pius, addressing 500 ecclesiastical members of the Catholic Action organization of Italy who participated in a pilgrimage of 1,000 Catholics yesterday to Rome, yesterday denounced indifference and distrust aimed against Catholic organizations for the young in Italy. His criticism was taken to be against the government, as he expressed regret that the more fact of being Catholic youths should represent a handicap in civil careers.

He concluded by urging the monks to contribute to the application and realization of the agreement between the Holy See and the Italian government.

Discussing the pope's speech, Giordano d'Italia, government organ, protested against the pope's attitude saying he must limit his action to his spiritual ministry.

Companion Saves
Driver From Death

LEWISTON, Ida., Sept. 17 (AP)—A companion who dipped water from a barrel for two hours to quench the flames which engulfed a truck driver when a burning pine tree fell across his truck was a modest hero here today.

John Wammanacker, truck driver, said the tree crashed down upon the machine, pinning W. H. Collin between the side of the truck and a barrel of water. Collin, with his clothing afire, cried for help and Wammanacker dipped water from the barrel until fire on Collin, the truck and the pine tree was snuffed out.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 (AP)—The stock market began to worry about credit conditions again today and prices sold off sharply after an opening outburst of strength. Declines in many of the active issues ran from one to six points but the selling slowed up in the early afternoon when bullish operations were resumed in a selected list of public utilities and specialties.

Call money rose to 1 1/2 per cent but advanced to 2 when banks began calling loans.
Contrasting movements featured the life insurance in the north and other groups, many of them more than 5 points, while May department stores declined 1 1/2. The market generally fluctuated in an erratic manner, the weakness of U. S. Steel and Radio having a restrictive effect on speculative buying.

The closing hour was busy, total sales approximated \$300,000 shares.

Saves Chief's Life

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 17 (AP)—Charles Fogler, chief of police at Warrenton, Ore., owes his life today to a worn out firing pin.

When the chief attempted to arrest W. A. Howles for speeding, Howles who was driving the car with Fogler in the rear seat, turned suddenly and jammed a large caliber revolver into Fogler's chest and pulled the trigger.

The shell did not explode and Fogler wrestled with Howles until he secured the weapon.

TRAPPER'S BODY FOUND

BEND, Ore., Sept. 17 (AP)—Sixteen hundred feet from the shelter of a cabin, the body of Charlie George, Bend trapper, missing since January, 1925, was found yesterday where he had died in the snow atop the broken top plateau while seeking shelter from a raging snowstorm.

The trapper apparently was following his trap line and was overtaken by a blizzard in the high Cascades.

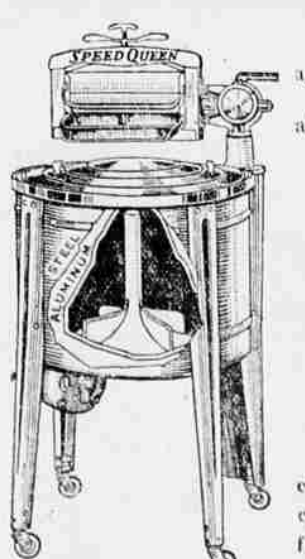
