SEEDING WHEAT IN WALLOWA CO.

Farmers Busy Putting in Grain—Hope For Rain Near Future.

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—Seeding of the fall wheat crops on the summer-fallowed land in this section is occupying the attention of many of the dry land farmers. While but little of the ground is thought to contain enough moisture to germinate the seed, farmers feel that this is the best time of the season to get the seed into the ground and are hoping for sufficient rain to bring it up in time to get a good start before freezing weather sets in. The bulk of the seeding has been held off about two weeks this fall because of the soil being so extremely dry and also because of the large number of grasshoppers which it was feared would work on the grain where the ground held enough moisture to bring it up. However, during the past two weeks the grasshoppers appear to have disappeared considerably and it is not thought to cause any great damage should the grain come up on parts of the fields. Practically all seed is being dry treated this fall and in the opinion of many farmers is much safer to sow under dry conditions than grain which has been soaked up by the old vitriol method. Roy Gartin, who recently purchased a large cleaning and treating machine for use in treating grain on his own farm, has been busy much of the time lately cleaning and treating wheat for many of his neighbors. The greater part of the farmers are cultivating their ground before seeding and many also are harrowing after the ground has been seeded, putting the fields in excellent condition. Pasture and range conditions are very bad in all sections except where it is possible to irrigate. Much of the stock held on the dry ranges is reported to be losing flesh. The sheep, which are still being held in the high mountains, are said to be faring quite well with the feed plentiful but dry and tough. The greater part of the cattle have been brought in and shipped from the bands here, with only a few lots of late lambs and some of the ewe lambs from some of the large bands being held on the ranges yet. The most of the lambs shipped from this section during the past several weeks are reported to have weighed exceptionally well, with some of the large lots averaging better than 30 pounds each when delivered during the first of the month. Coley Wray and Mr. Hoop, local contractors, have been busy recently building a new barn for Thomas Scott, of Middle Valley. The new structure is 24x36 feet.

Italian Prunes, Grapes Plentiful Now In Portland
—Portland, Ore., Sept. 18 (AP)—Italian prunes for eating and canning and grapes of all varieties for jellies as well as eating are cheap and abundant, according to a leading fruit and produce company. Homeowners who wish to can prunes were advised to take advantage of the present market. The prunes are wholesaling at 2 1/2 to 3 cents a pound. Seedless grapes being \$1.25 per big box, Tokyo \$1.75, while Malaga \$1.75 and Oregon Concord 3 cents.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable market, the Portland Market News service of the United States department of agriculture says: The wholesale fruit and vegetable market remained about steady for nearly all classes of produce. Supplies of home grown produce continue heavy, and prices are low for these commodities. Apples, pears, peaches and pomegranates, all of which are mostly shipped in from outside points, are held lower and cutting the bell rope into pieces, which they detested, then by removing the clapper from the bell and hitting it. Wheat Unsettled And Lower Today

(CHICAGO, Sept. 18 (AP))—Reported need of more rain in Argentina, together with continued unfavorable crop outlook from Australia, tended to make wheat prices here average higher early today. Opening unchanged to 1/2 higher, Chicago wheat afterward reacted somewhat at times. With frost reports numerous, corn and oats showed relative firmness, corn starting at 1/2 to 1/4 advance, but subsequently sagging. Provisions likewise showed gains. Wheat closed unsettled 1/2 to 3/4 under yesterday's finish. Corn closed unchanged to 1/4 lower, oats 1/4 to 1/2 up and provisions varying from 1/2 decline to a gain of 2 1/2 c.
