

Egg and Butter Prices Firm In Oregon Market

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 19 (AP).—Egg and butter were firm today, but no change was made in prices at the Portland produce exchange. Lined oil has advanced 7 cents a gallon, retaining the decline of last week and putting the raw product in barrel lots at \$1.50 a gallon, the highest mark in a year. The Portland Market News service of the U. S. department of agriculture bulletin says: Local tomatoes are very plentiful, and demand is slow, at 25¢ to 40¢ cents per box to retailers. Lettuce of ordinary quality, grown locally, moves slowly, at \$1.00 to \$1.25 per crate of 2 to 3 dozen heads. Quality of this home-grown lettuce is improving, however, and solid heads, 3 dozen to the crate, are bringing \$2.00. Oregon Italian grapes are selling for 2 to 30 per lb. Potatoes of excellent quality, but offered for sale in apple boxes and other unsuitable containers, are as low as 10¢ per lb. Supplies of potatoes from Yakima are liberal, but the market remains about steady at the rather high price of \$3.00 per c. w. t. to retailers. Division of several cars to California points has aided in maintaining these high potato values. In spite of reports from California, the effect that grape prices

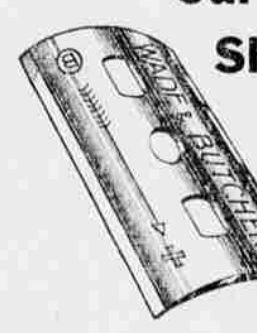
