

Annual Oregon State Fair Will Open On Monday

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 19 (AP)—Yesterday was the 67th anniversary of the permanent selection of Salem as Oregon's state fair city, according to records produced by Albert Foster, custodian of Champey park. The selection was made by vote of the Oregon Agricultural society. Eugene received one vote, Corvallis one, Oregon City two and Salem 65.

The 68th annual state fair will open Monday, weather permitting. Former attendance records are likely to be broken, particularly for the reason that a new \$150,000 combined grandstand and exhibit building stands over against the race course for the accommodation of crowds. This supplants the former inadequate stand and the frame structure that for many years was known as the "old pavilion." Part of the old building was salvaged and has been attached to the east end of the "new pavilion." It has been given a new front and will be used for the boys' and girls' club exhibits.

The Oregon state exhibit which has held a prominent place at the Sacramento fair this season, arrived Wednesday in charge of D. M. Lowe, of Ashland, president of the Western States Exposition Exhibitors. The exhibit won first prize in California.

Counties that will have exhibits are Marion, Polk, Linn, Yamhill, Washington, Lane, Tillamook, Josephine, Clatsop, Multnomah, Clackamas, Jackson and Wasco. The livestock stables are filling rapidly, the show horses from the Frank stables of Portland and the Spreckels stables of San Francisco are here, and the racing program will be up to standard. Other animals for the nightly horse show are to arrive.

Carnival and outdoor vaudeville attractions will be more elaborate than ever before, with the space vacated by the old pavilion being awarded concessions.

Public Land Transfer proposal Involves Acreage of 190,031,722

WASHINGTON (AP)—If President Hoover's plan for transferring public lands to the states meets the approval of the commission he will appoint and finds favor in congress, 190,031,722 acres of land will be placed in the hands of the states. The greater portion of the area is in states west of the eastern Colorado and Wyoming border, Nevada, where 52,410,938 acres or 71 per cent of the entire state is in public domain, will be most greatly affected.

The amount received from that source was \$3,926,150. The sale of public land brought \$312,144. The sale of reversioned timber and railroad lands in the northwest netted \$684,018 and power site lease fees totaled \$12,302.

The remainder of the money came from widely scattered sources. The only eastern state with any appreciable area in public lands is Florida, with 13,865 acres, largely in swamp land in the center of the Everglades.

There are scattered parcels of ground belonging to the government in Alabama, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Oklahoma and Wisconsin.
