Capt. Salisbury Bringing Famous Film "Gow" Here

How he was mistaken for the president of the United States and royally feted on his visit to the semi-barbarous kingdom of Abyssinia on his last expedition will be one of the many very interesting features of a descriptive lecture to be given here Saturday and Sunday in the Star theater by Captain E. A. Salisbury, traveler and explorer. Captain Salisbury will be here with his famous picture "Gow."

This picture is of life among the cannibals and headhunters of the South Seas and will show the almost unbelievable things of which one reads. In fast succession, thrill upon thrill, are shown wonderful scenes of the islands themselves, the odd ceremonies and costumes of these savage tribes, their weird religious dances and the more intimate details of their everyday lives. The climax depicts a combat between two of the head-hunting tribes for the possession of the chieftain "Gow's" daughter.

In relating his experience in Abyssinia, Captain Salisbury says: "At the end of my last expedition, I decided to visit Rostafri, ruler of Abyssinia, and deliver to him a letter of introduction from ex-President Taft."

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"When I explained the error, the officer shrugged and said: 'We can't disappoint the people. They are dressed for a celebration. For the time you just be the president of the United States!'"

And so, Captain Salisbury went on, he was given a fine palace with two royal lions before his door and a host of slaves at his beck. For dinner he had "20 dancing girls

and everything." He met the king, who he says is probably the only real king in the world with absolute power over his subjects, and the king's aunt, a cousin of the Queen of Sheba.

Later, but not least, Salisbury was made a knight of the Abyssinian court with all the ceremony and feathers imaginable. He said the setting of the throne room was gorgeous beyond description. There were 400 warriors all in gold trappings and the king, who looked like the picture of Othello, was bedecked with many precious stones.
