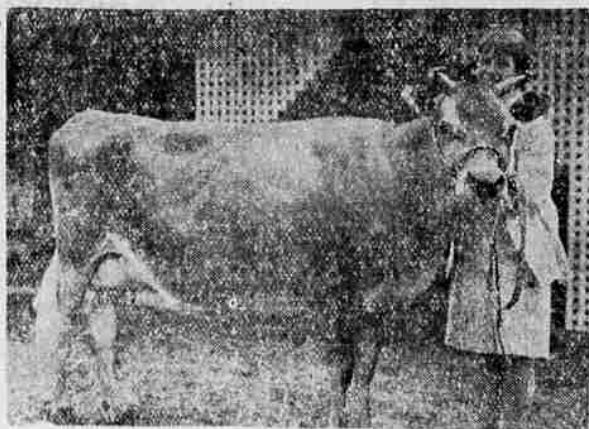


OVER THE VALLEY
