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THEATER TO  
BE REBUILT;  
WORK BEGINSWill Be Erected Especially  
For Talkies—Architect-  
ecture to be Spanish.WILL BE OPEN IN  
ABOUT TWO MONTHSConcrete Structure to Ac-  
commodate 600 Persons  
—Plans for Beautiful  
Building Completed.Heralding a beautiful addition  
to La Grande's business section,  
workmen this morning started  
tearing down the Star theater  
building. Coincident with this  
activity, the La Grande The-  
aters, Inc., announced that a  
splendid new theater would re-  
place the present structure.The new theater, which is to be  
completed within two months if  
weather conditions are favorable,  
will be of concrete with the en-  
tire all of terra cotta mission tile.  
The general architecture of the  
building, both inside and out, will  
be Spanish.

To Accommodate 600

The building will occupy the  
same space as at present, 60 by  
110 feet, but the seating ar-  
rangements will be changed so that  
approximately 600 persons will  
be accommodated.The rear end is to be rebuilt for  
Vitaphone horns, in screen placed  
back and down and the organ con-  
sole will be in a pit. The interior  
will be arranged particularly so as  
to afford the best acoustics for  
the installation of Western Electric  
sound equipment, thus giving La  
Grande two modern talking pic-  
ture theaters, either of which will  
rank with the best in the inland  
Empire.The plan for the front of the  
building, which has been completed  
by Charles B. Miller, architect,  
shows a handsome and beautiful  
building. The main entrance is  
on the left, with a wide staircase  
on either side are located orna-  
mental work, and all ceilings will  
be of terra cotta mission tile. The  
main entrance will be finished in  
polychrome tile wainscots and  
Spanish quarry stone floors. There  
are two front exits provided for,  
which will be used continuously  
and always will be open.

Small Store Room

On one side of the main entrance  
is a small store room, and on the  
opposite side is the entrance vesti-  
bule and poster cabinets. There  
will be a larger foyer inside than  
before. A ladies' lounge room will  
be placed on the mezzanine floor.  
All of the interior will be re-  
decorated in typical Spanish de-  
sign, including carpets, draperies,  
etc. The curtain will be automatic.  
The stairway going to the mezzanine  
will have wrought iron rails in  
Spanish design.H. P. Nielsen, local contractor,  
is in charge of the rebuilding work.  
In connection with the building  
of the new theater, the manager

won the silver cup in the speaking  
contest, each speaker talking on  
the subject "Why the Oregon state  
fair."For the best individual musical  
presentation the cup went to Miss  
Roberta Morton, accordion soloist  
of Salem.A chorus of 35 boys from the  
state training school, under the  
direction of O. J. Hall of Salem,  
won the silver cup trophy for  
the best chorus work.About 800 Community Club

Gradual Growth,  
Pastor AssertsSouth Methodist Congre-  
gation Told of His Ap-  
pearance—L. D. S. Con-  
ference Held Here."The God of the Old Testament"  
was the subject of the sermon by  
the pastor, the Rev. Frank Har-  
dick, at the M. E. Church South  
Sunday morning. "Many assert,"  
said he, "that the old Hebrew idea  
of God was simply that of a tribal  
deity much on a par with that of  
the surrounding pagan nations;  
that their idea of God gradually  
grew from such a proportion to  
that of large ideas. But such is not  
the case," said the pastor. "Ad-  
mitting growth and development  
in the normal way of the old  
Jewish idea of God, as such knowl-  
edge would naturally develop, yet  
the Hebrews did not develop a  
pantheistic idea of their deity at all  
like the surrounding nations. God  
revealed himself to them—to Noah,  
Abraham, Moses, and the prophets.  
And when he appears on the his-  
torical scenes in the Old Testament  
records he acts, talks, teaches, and  
works wonders exactly as we  
should expect the living God to so  
act. There is nothing abnormal  
in the Old Testament records of  
God's coming and working among  
men. We should not expect either  
less or more of him either then or  
now, should he so reveal himself  
to us today. As in the Old Testa-  
ment God acted as we ought ex-  
pect him to so move among men,  
so also in the New Testament  
Jesus Christ came and worked  
wonders, and taught, lived, and  
acted exactly as we should expect  
the Son of God to do."The Rev. J. A. McKee, D. D.,  
conference superintendent of Sun-  
day schools and leagues, preached  
Sunday night. He also gave an in-  
teresting talk to the league work-  
ers. The services at both hours,  
including the Sunday School and  
leagues, were well attended.Throughout the church yester-

sion died out in the air, Florence  
Trumbull, daughter of Connecti-  
cut's governor, and John Coolidge,  
son of ex-president Calvin Cool-  
idge, were married here late today  
in the white frame village Congre-  
gational church.PLAINVILLE, Conn., Sept. 22—  
(AP)—Florence Trumbull, daugh-  
ter of Connecticut's governor, and  
John Coolidge, son of a former  
Massachusetts governor and ex-  
president of the United States, will  
be married here late today in the  
presence of notables of New Eng-  
land and the nation.Two United States senators, both  
former Connecticut governors, and  
the members of Governor Trum-  
bull's military staff will be among  
those present at the ceremony,  
which will take place in the village  
Congregational church. The re-  
minder of the guests will be lim-  
ited to friends and relatives of the  
Coolidge and Trumbull families.The nuptials, although colored  
by autumnal tints in decoration  
and bridal attire, will be marked  
by New England restraint and dig-  
nity. Only 82 guests, seated in the  
center section of the little church,  
will witness the services.

Quiet Family Wedding

The large delegation of news-  
papermen and photographers who  
have gathered for the event will be  
excluded from the church, in keep-  
ing with the desire of the bridal  
pair to make the wedding a quiet  
family affair. Two ministers will  
officiate at the service. The Rev.  
Kenneth Wolles, of Albany, former  
pastor of the Congregational  
church at Northampton, Mass., to  
whose services the bridegroom lis-  
tened as a school boy, will perform  
the ceremony. He will be assisted  
by the Rev. J. Roy Willerson, pas-  
tor of the Plainville Congrega-  
tional church. The simple Congrega-  
tional service and the single ring  
ceremony will be brief.A half-hour's musical program  
will be given while the guests as-  
semble for the wedding. Just be-  
fore the wedding march "O Fran-  
cisco Me," by Reginald de Kromen,  
will be played.Then comes the wedding process-  
ional, the bridal chorus from  
Lohengrin and the bride enters the  
church on the arm of her father,  
Mendelssohn's wedding march will  
be played.

Boulder Dam To  
Be Greater If  
Plan AcceptedWASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—  
Secretary of the Interior today  
announced that the boulder dam  
reclamation bureau had been in-  
structed to study plans of Boulder  
dam with a view to building the  
dam 25 feet higher than was first  
planned.Commissioner Mead of the re-  
clamation service has been in-  
structed to give careful consideration  
to the factors of safety, power, ad-  
dition of water, and the possi-  
bility of prolonging the life of  
the project if the structure is given  
the additional height.If the dam is built 25 feet high-  
er, it will be 725 feet from the  
bottom of the foundation to the  
top and 550 feet above the present  
waterlevel of the Colorado river.  
For each additional foot on the  
height of the dam, Commissioner  
Mead said there would be made  
available a minimum increase of  
150,000 acre feet of storage space  
and a decided gain in power cap-  
acity.The dam is built 25 feet high-  
er, it will be 725 feet from the  
bottom of the foundation to the  
top and 550 feet above the present  
waterlevel of the Colorado river.

SHOT DOWN IN  
MADISON, WIS.MADISON, Wis., Sept. 22 (AP)—  
Gannon in ambush killed a  
three-year-old child in the arms of  
his father in Madison's "Little It-  
aly" late last night. The father,  
Charles Gnos, was wounded per-  
haps fatally.A shotgun loaded with slugs was  
used. Gnos, carrying his son,  
Frank, in his arms, was walking  
toward a dark alley when his at-  
tacker opened fire. Doctors said  
that the child suffered the brunt  
of the shot and that they added,  
saying the elder Gnos from instant  
death.A liquor war was blamed for the  
killing, the latest of a series in  
"Little Italy" within a year.
