Cripple Shoots

Up Theater; Two

Hurt In Fracas

CHICAGO, Sept. 23 (AP)—A cripple with a pistol shot up the Gen. theatre, a south State street burlesque house, last night, wounding Charles Bell, 40-year-old doorman, so seriously that he may die. The man with the gun, Sam Porcuro, was disarmed and captured by Sgt. Kenneth R. Cox of the Detroit police department. In Chicago to install a radio call system.

Porcuro and a companion became angered when the doorman told them no main floor seats were available. Porcuro brandished his cane but Bell brushed it aside. The cripple then drew a revolver, firing six shots. Five entered Bell's body and the sixth struck Edward Richard, waiting in line for a ticket. Richard's wound was slight.

Twenty chorus girls ran from the theatre to the street in their stage costumes when the shooting began. Sgt. Cox who was witnessing the show, ran to the rear of the theatre, knocked the smoking gun from Porcuro's hand, and arrested him. Porcuro's companion fled.

The theatre is located at 450 south State street, in the center of "The Little White Way" where tiny, gaudy "sidelights" and picture houses are squeezed between cheap hotels and small shops.

High school has been in session for about two weeks now, and pupils are getting settled into the full business of attending school. Unusual enthusiasm has been shown this year in school activities, scholarship, and attendance. Recently two boys refused an opportunity to work for an afternoon, because they wanted the points that 100 per cent attendance would give them towards the honor roll.

Some of the rooms were entirely

sold for student body tickets before the tickets were off the press. There is a contest between the classes as to which one will sell the greatest percentage of student body tickets. This contest closes tonight, and the winners will be announced tomorrow.

Points are given for placing in contests, and at the end of the year the class having the most points will have its name engraved on the cup which has been purchased by the student body for the pep contests. The first numerals to be engraved will be those of the classes of '29 and '30 who tied for first last year.

High school enrollment has reached 595. Last year at the end of the first month the enrollment was 565, an increase of 30 with two weeks "to go."

NEWBURYPORT, Mass., Sept. 23 (AP)—Arthur Schreiber, 22-year-old Portland, Me., youth who last June stowed himself away on the trans-Atlantic plane Yellow Bird on its flight between Old Orchard, Me., and Southampton, Spain, today hovered between life and death at a hospital, the victim of an automobile accident.

Schreiber received a fractured skull and other injuries when an automobile, owned by his father, but driven by Maurice Drees, 25, turned over on the Newburyport turnpike yesterday.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 23 (AP)—Grover, Samuel, Portland lawyer, who has been in the Salem Grange at hospital since Saturday, following an automobile collision on the Pacific highway 10 miles north of Salem, was reported by his physician today as progressing favorably.

Samuels has a head injury and is believed to be suffering from concussion of the brain, but other injuries are said not to be serious. The doctor was of the opinion that Samuels would be released from the hospital here in a day or two, but would have to enter a hospital in Portland for further attention.
