"The Idle Rich," which opened
Sunday at the Arcade theater as a
new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer talkie
feature, is William de Mille's third
all-dialogue picture.

The noted director's first sound
picture was "The Doctor's Secret."
His next was a dramatization of his
own dramatic sketch, "The Man
Higher Up," in which the late
Theodore Roberts starred on the
stage.

In the present film, which is tal-
ken from the famous stage comedy
hit, "White Collars," de Mille has
included many novel sound effects

"Black Magic" Is
At Colonial
Tuesday Only

With a lonely tropical island as
its setting and an elaborate "for-
plot" as its theme, "Black Magic"
is one of those all-too-rare screen
productions that disclose unusual

originality on the part of its mak-
ers. The picture which plays at
the Colonial theater Tuesday only,
is an admirable study in psychol-
ogy, and yet is handled in such a
manner as to make it of absorbing
interest to every spectator.

Three human deities, endeavor-
ing to forget their shady pasts,
unite in an effort to obtain a young
fortune in pearls from a successful
explorer on the eve of his depart-
ure for "Borneo." With the com-
pliance of a native witch-doctor and
a rascally trader, an ingenious
scheme is planned and put into
execution, the object being to per-
suade the explorer that unless he
buys his freedom with his pearls,
he will be mysteriously killed.

Although the spectators are, to
a certain extent, "in" on the
scheme, nevertheless the remark-
able work of the cinematographers
and the cast manner in which three
of them "ride" serve to keep the inter-
est up to a notable pitch as this
sequence unfolds. The ending of
the picture is as dramatic as it is
totally unexpected, and effectively
rounds out this very unique pro-
duction.
