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GRAIN MARKET
LOWER IN WEEK

Wheat declines Five to Seven Cents — Slow Demand Weakening Factor

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 23 — Grain markets suffered moderate to sharp declines during the week ending September 21. Influenced largely by a continued slow export demand and record domestic stocks of wheat, together with less active inquiry for feed grains as a result of improved pasturage, and more favorable prospects for late corn, according to the weekly grain market review of the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics. Wheat declined 5c to 7c and feed grains 1c to 2c per bushel. Rye was lower but flax prices closed practically unchanged although fluctuations were rather sharp during the week.

No Market Change

There were no market changes in the general wheat market situation. Good yields and high quality wheat have been obtained in the United Kingdom, Spain, France, Italy and Germany, and native wheats of good quality were being offered freely in European markets at relatively lower prices than foreign grains. Import demand, therefore, continued of only moderate volume, with Argentine wheat still underselling United States grain in foreign markets. At the close of the week 62 1/2 lb. durum for November shipment was quoted at Liverpool at \$1.55 1/2, compared with \$1.50 1/2 for the same grade for October shipment at \$1.29 1/2. No. 2 Manitoba for immediate shipment was being offered at \$1.61 1/2 per bushel. Native wheat at Paris was quoted Sept. 20 at \$1.47 to \$1.48 1/2 per bushel and at Hamburg \$1.58 1/2.

Crop conditions in the southern hemisphere continue rather unfavorable because of dry weather. Saturated, sloughy ground, but were insufficient to supply needed moisture for favorable crop development. It is still early in the season, however, and good general rains during the next few weeks might materially improve the crop outlook. Argentine shipments of wheat continue of good volume and totaled slightly over five million bushels during the week. Australian shipments totaled a little over one million bushels. About one-fourth of the Argentine shipments were to England, with a slightly smaller amount to the continent. Most of the remainder was on order.

Wheat

Domestic cash wheat markets declined 5c to 7c per bushel as a result of the slow demand, caused in part by the scarcity of storage space.

Pacific coast markets were also dull and lower. The export demand for both grain and flour was very slack at both Portland and San Francisco. Some inquiry was being received at Portland from European buyers but these bids were around 5c to 6c below current wheat quotations in that market.

Big head domestic hard white wheat quoted Sept. 20 at Portland at \$1.34 per bushel, soft white and western white at \$1.23 1/2, and hard winter, northern spring and western red at \$1.02 1/2 per bushel. A fair local flour business was reported by San Francisco mills but export demand was somewhat dull. Mills were supplying their needs largely from local wheat receipts although fairly large quantities of high protein wheat were being received at San Francisco from the intermountain states, and these were being taken by local mills for mixing purposes. Prices of both in, domestic and western wheat remained too high for feeding purposes, although a few scattered lots of northern wheat were being received by local mills. No. 1 hard white was quoted Sept. 20 at San Francisco at \$2.28 to \$2.29 per hundred or \$1.32 to \$1.33 per bushel, and No. 2 soft white wheat was \$2.15 to \$2.20 per hundred or \$1.29 to \$1.32 per bushel. Receipts at Los Angeles were mostly of local, domestic or western white wheat, with arrivals of hard or hard winter small. Mills were the principal buyers and good milling wheat was quoted in that market Sept. 20 at \$2.30 to \$2.35 per hundred or \$1.33 to \$1.41 per bushel. Receipts totaled twenty cars which was almost double that of the previous week.
