We can think of no greater handicap for a young bridegroom who would get on in the world than to be known as the son of an ex-president. John Coolidge, who is probably an average American youth, gets married and soon must go on to his clerkship with the New York, New Haven and Hartford railway. If he has ability, the railroad company will probably recognize it in due course of time. If he hasn't, all roads are usually rather hardboiled and not permanently influenced by the former political prominence of an employee's family. The sooner that connection is forgotten the sooner young John will have a chance to make progress on his own merits. And that's the only variety of progress any young man should cherish.

The first full year's session of the Eastern Oregon normal school is under way. Two years ago we recall numerous local pessimists expressing the opinion that the school would never be realized and now the community is apparently taking the fall term very much as a matter of course. Actually La Grande is keenly alert to the school and anxious to render any service that its faculty and student body may become happy and satisfied units in the community life. Further than that, this city wants the normal school to grow and expand as time goes on, but our first desire is that growth and expansion be won through meritorious service to the people of Eastern Oregon. We are confident they will be realized rapidly on that basis.

THE HANDICAP OF AVIATION

The men in charge of the country's commercial aviation firms continue to see a bright future ahead. Air transportation, they are firmly convinced, has come to stay; not only that, it is only beginning to show its usefulness.

Obviously, the one great obstacle in the way of these companies is the widespread public feeling that the airplane is not quite safe, and never will be. The public demands speed, but it also demands safety; and, despite its growing enthusiasm for aviation, it still has a lurking suspicion that the airplane has not quite proved its dependability.

It is interesting, under these circumstances, to look back at the public reception that greeted other forms of transportation when they were first introduced.

It is only a century, for instance, since the school trustees in an Ohio town indignantly refused to let the school house be used for a debate, "Is the Steam Engine Feasible?" Extension of the first railways to certain European cities brought loud protests from the doctors, who said not only that it would be unsafe for people to ride on fast-moving trains but that even spectators would find their health impaired by the strain of gazing at objects moving at the unheard-of speed of 20 miles an hour.

The early river steamers were, for many years after their introduction, considered a highly risky form of transportation. The boilers on the early marine engines were decidedly unstable. Explosions that caused wrecks and took many lives were common. Yet the steamboat gained favor, despite these very real risks its passengers ran—and, in the course of time, the risks were eliminated.

It is barely 20 years since magazines were carrying articles discussing the question whether the automobile would be a passing fad like the bicycle or would become an integral part of the nation's transportation system.

These bits of ancient history are worth relating, because the airplane is encountering the same sort of attitude. It seems safe to predict that the airplane, like the train, the steamer and the auto, will finally win out.

Health Talks

TYPHOID FEVER AND ITS PREVENTION
Immunization Considered Safe and Simple Procedure

Whenever a doctor is called to see a child with typhoid fever, the thought immediately comes to him that here is a preventable disease in which some one has been negligent. Negligent may be the term applied, in that the parents of the child could have, most likely, prevented this long, tiresome, serious illness that is always inevitable with a case of typhoid fever.

So many children with typhoid fever have complications of all sorts and kinds, with all degrees of virulence. Now that the health departments of our states, counties and cities are so well equipped and organized, there is no reason why every child can not be properly immunized against one of our most dreaded diseases.

The act of preventing typhoid fever is so simple a procedure, so harmless in its action, so painless in its administration, so lasting in its effect that all children should be immunized. Really when one stops to think, is it not rather a serious mistake not to have your child protected from so grave a disease as typhoid fever?

The injections are usually given one week apart, three injections as a rule conveying immunity from the disease for three to five years or possibly longer.

Knowing the origin of typhoid fever, the modes of its transmission, no child can really be safe from the disease. When or where can you say that every drop of water, milk or food has not become contaminated with the germs of typhoid fever? The glass of water

or milk may have been perfectly clean from its source and a fly might have touched the glass with its feet, teeming with the germs of typhoid fever and in a given time the child will come down with the disease.

Great strides have been made in the last ten years towards the control and eradication of typhoid fever. Do not forget the school child in helping to stamp out and prevent this disease. Talk to your

doctor. Just because there is no typhoid fever in your community now, it does not mean that there never will be any, and it might be in your family.

A child of school age should be given the protective treatment, because, away from home and home surroundings, the cleanliness can not always be watched. The food taken can not be supervised and the quality of the food might not be the same as the food the child receives at home.

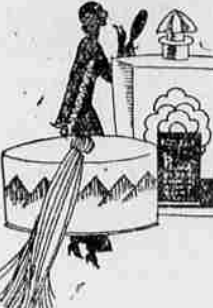
