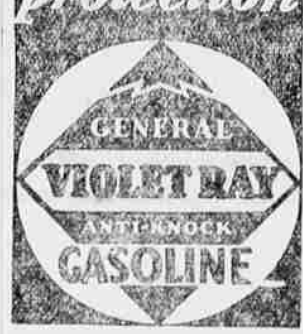
Facts About the Capital

High Schools Undergo Numerous Changes In 39-Year Period in U. S.

There has been considerable change in high schools in the 39 years since 1890 when they were attended only by the elite, and the intellectuals in order to select unusual pupils for the traditional classical education. Now all children grow up with the ambition to attend high school and discover their own abilities.

Formerly high schools were located in select centers, with only 4,158 schools in the United States. In 1929 there were 20,000 schools of secondary education located with easy access to the majority. The estimated enrollment of 4,000,000 for 1929 seems immense when compared with the 296,733 pupils enrolled in 1890, more than eleven times as many.

Almost 40 years ago, high schools were modified colleges, with considerable change between the grammar schools of eight grades and the high school of four. Since then these 12 school years have been divided differently to make a more gradual transition from grades to high, by forming a junior high. This is a 6-2-3 plan six years of grades, three years of junior high, and three in senior high.

The subject matter taught today

is considered a means to an end, either as college preparatory, or vocational guidance. Formerly the teaching of traditional academic subjects was considered as an end in itself.

A new method of learning, by doing, is employed in place of the former memorizing plan. Every effort is now made that will aim to promote citizenship, good character, efficiency and similar ideals.

The results of today's schools are extremely democratic when compared with the results expected in 1890. Now they aim to retain children in order to discover and develop their abilities, and get them started in life, but formerly the sole aim was to eliminate all but the most intellectual and send those select few to college.

These facts are gleaned from the research bulletin of the National Education association.
