PROTECT THE SCHOOL CHILD'S HEALTH

As the new school year swings into full stride the chief concern of many mothers is the protection of their children against contagious diseases. The school room is too often the spreading point for infections and the health of the school children of the community becomes the responsibility of La Grande parents.

For those fathers and mothers who have had their children immunized against diphtheria, typhoid, small pox and scarlet fever these diseases have no terror. But all children have not been inoculated or vaccinated, as the case may be, and they are consequently constantly in danger when children suffering from sore throats, bad colds, etc., are allowed to continue in the school room. Other diseases for which no preventative has yet been found can also be carried at school and the consideration that parents owe each other in mutual care receives greater emphasis from this fact.

All children hate to miss school, to get behind in their work. Most of them naturally oppose any suggestion that they stay home a day or two when suffering with a bad cold, a sore throat or a slight fever. Frequently teachers are inclined to discuss absences too severely because of the interruption in the school program. Yet a definite policy that would keep such cases out of school would be the best that could be adopted by the parents of La Grande, both for the sake of the children and their school progress. School days that are lost can be made up but child health and child life once lost through careless spreading of infection can never be regained.

Thoughtful parents and thoughtful teachers can well cooperate to keep school room infections at minimum. When a child complains of a sore throat or is obviously suffering from a cold infection, school authorities should not only permit but encourage teachers to send the child home, both for its own good and the good of the group. In addition to this, parents should undertake to have their children immunized against those childhood diseases that are preventable. Inoculation is absolutely harmless, in the case of diphtheria for example, and is absolutely certain to give protection. The expense of the injections is minor and where parents are unable to afford it, the city will pay for the sum. Four or five deaths from this disease here last year indicate the importance of all parents taking the precaution.

Another step toward improved child health would be the making of whooping cough a quarantine case. Those who complain of the inconvenience of such strict health policies have little to support their arguments. The life of one child is worth more than all the inconveniences that this community could suffer from safeguards in a lifetime.

Health Talks

THAT OUNCE OF PREVENTION

Perhaps you wonder why some particular child suffers from decayed teeth. You know he is active and persistent with his tooth brush. You know he is not undernourished—that he sits at a table where wholesome food is served in sensible proportions. But his teeth decay! He is a victim of dental caries, a most destructive disease, common to all civilized mankind. For tooth decay is a disease, but, being common, many do not think of it as such.

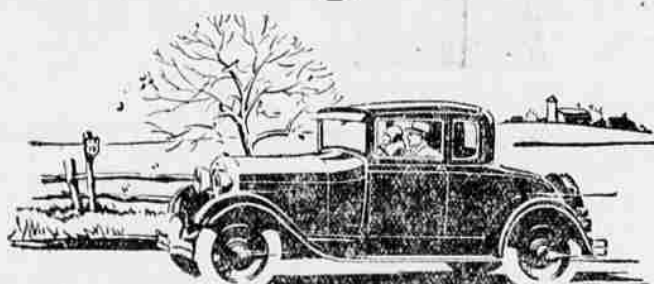
In most mouths there are deep pits, grooves, sometimes actual fissures, between the cusps of the

back teeth. Into such places food may pack, and usually does pack, remain, ferment and start decay. Could you imagine a more ideal place for decay than under the dark, warm, secluded and protected layers of moist food? Could you expect the child, with his brush, and usual childish methods, to remove from such places every particle of food debris? Could you, with a broom, remove every particle of packed debris from a floor so adorned with holes and cracks?

A great cause of trouble is removed by the filling of such little canyons when the teeth appear, and before decay has really started. You may think and correctly too, that some may receive treatment in this way when not actually in need. However, such cases are extremely rare and no harm is done if small fillings are inserted. It is truly a prophylactic measure like that of the farmer, who, spraying his potato field, covers every vine, and is not concerned if, in so doing, he treats the rare plant not actually in need.

Much pain, apprehension, humiliation and regret have been avoided by early attention to the mouths of children. Early and frequent examination has prevented many a crippled mouth and general ill health. But, so much remains to be done that it looms before the dental profession, and the intelligent public, as a serious problem. To bring greater of our young people to mankind and womanhood with the expectancy of good mouths for a lifetime, the dental profession must have the whole-souled co-operation of the public it serves.

Fuel system of the new Ford has been designed for reliability and long service

of good service. Since all adjustments are fixed except the needle valve and idler, there is practically nothing to get out of order.

The choke rod on the dash acts as a primer and also as a regulator of your gasoline mixture. The new hot-spot manifold insures complete vaporization of the gasoline before it enters the combustion chamber of the engine.

As a matter of fact, the fuel system of the new Ford is so simple in design and so carefully made that it requires very little service attention.

The filter or sediment bulb should be cleaned at regular intervals and the carburetor screen removed and washed in gasoline. Occasionally the drain plug at the bottom of the carburetor should be removed and the carburetor drained for a few seconds.

Have your Ford dealer look after these little details for you when you have the car oiled and greased. A periodic checking-up costs little, but it has a great deal to do with long life and continuously good performance.

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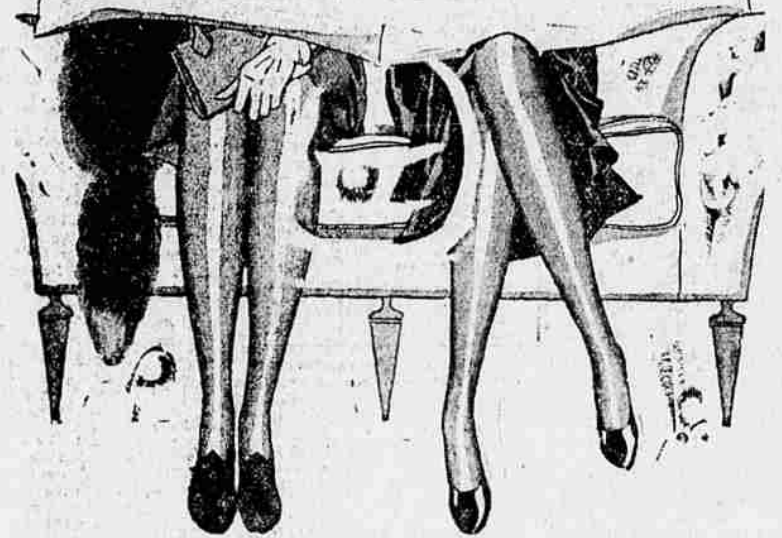
