Grounds Crowded
By noon the grounds were seething with humanity and it was impossible for automobiles to get within a convenient area about the rollicking and colorful city that is the Oregon state fair. State fair officials say today will be a record breaker, although there were some tremendous Wednesdays a few years back.

Wednesday, Salem day, and Thursday, Portland day, always vie for attendance, with the odds usually in Wednesday's favor because of the Salem patronage. Since there is indication of fair weather all week the remaining days also should be big.

Horse Show Held
Some of the finest horses ever shown in a Pacific coast horse show were put through their paces in the fair stadium Tuesday evening. The horse shows are a leading feature of the state fair and the large number of valuable awards offered this year as well as the promise of much stimulating competition, have attracted a number of leading fanciers on the coast who have previously passed up the Oregon show.

California horses and entries from Illinois took the majority of the prizes money Tuesday evening. Aaron M. Frank, of Portland, took the blue in the only event in which he exhibited. His new hunter, Big Canada, ridden by Miss Hilda McCormick Cook, of Seattle, won the sweepstakes in the jumpers class. Another Portland horse, Williamette, owned by Lewis E. Banks, took second place in the novice five-gaited saddle horse class and placed fifth in the \$500 stake event offered by Montgomery Ward & Co. for fine harness horses. A fine polo pony owned by Dr. and Mrs. J. H. Held, of Portland, took second in the little-weight polo pony event.

First prize in the Montgomery Ward stake event was won by Rosewall, Irvin H. Hellman's prize chestnut gelding from his Beverly Hills stables.

The Carnation Farm stables, of Pomona, Cal., captured seven ribbons in the six events entered, taking first in the harness horses pairs, entry; first in the novice five-gaited saddle horse class when Peavine's Artist took the blue; first in the harness horses ladies' single; second in the novice three-gaited class; second in the harness horses pairs; fourth in the novice hunters; and second in the \$500 stake event for fine harness horses.

The first night of the driving competition between the heavy six in hand draft horses for the \$1000 stake offered by the U. S. National bank of Portland, was held with entries from the Carnation Farm Products company, from the A. C. Ruby stable, entries by McCroskey and White and D. E. Burge.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Sept. 25 (AP)—A slowly falling barometer this morning heralded the approach of a tropical disturbance, believed centering northeast of Nassau, Bahamas, and moving toward the coast.

The barometer here at eight o'clock stood at 29.97, a fall of .09 since yesterday. Rainfall during the past twelve hours amounted to .14 of an inch and a moderate breeze of 14 miles per hour swept the city. Shipping generally held to port awaiting developments.
