### MENUS

#### Big Sister Mary

Since many of the fruits generally used for preserves and jams have been high in price this year, a few recipes for quinces may not come amiss.

Plain canned quinces are excellent in winter fruit salads. They have a tang which combines well with other fruits and their firm texture prevents them from crushing and becoming mushy.

Quince honey is decidedly old-timey. It's delicious with hot rolls or baking powder biscuits for "tea." A preserve used with a warm bread often makes a dessert unnecessary in an informal meal and saves a busy housekeeper the time and effort of making a cake or pudding.

#### Quince Honey

Six large quinces, 6 pounds sugar, 64 cups water.

Pare, quarter and core quinces. Grate or put through the fine knife of food chopper. Put sugar and water into preserving kettle and cook ten minutes. Add quinces and cook 30 minutes longer. Pour into sterilized jelly glasses and cover with paraffin when cold.

#### Chopped Quince

Pare, core and chop quinces. Measure. To three cups of fruit add one cup of water and cook until tender. Add four cups of sugar and cook for fifteen minutes longer. Pour into sterilized pint cans and seal.

Quinces are also good as spiced sweet pickles. They are pared, quartered and cored and simmered in vinegar-syrup until tender. A good rule for the spiced vinegar-syrup is one pound of light brown sugar to each cup of cider vinegar and one teaspoon each of broken stick cinnamon, cloves and allspice tied in a bag. The spices of course can be varied to suit individual tastes. Ground spices can be used but the pickled fruit will not be as clear and deliciously colored.

### THREE CITIES BURIED ONE ABOVE THE OTHER

TOLEDO (AP)—Three ancient cities, one buried below the other, have been unearthed by the Toledo Museum of Art-University of Michigan expedition at Teli Omar on the Tigris river, 15 miles south of Baghdad.

Selukia, the most recent, was capital of the eastern fourth of the empire of Alexander the Great. Opis, beneath it, was a trading post of the Sumerians, mentioned in Babylonian literature as a city of great renown, believed to date back to 1500 B. C. Below Opis lay Akshak, which thrived during the time of Ur of the Chaldeans and of Abraham. It was 2,000 years old when King Tutankhamen reigned.
