Manufacturer, 62, Fatally Injured

CHICAGO, Sept. 25 (AP)—Charles M. Keeley, 62, manufacturer, was found unconscious and probably fatally injured today in the South Side apartment of Mrs. Florence Jacobs, 35. His skull had been fractured by a blow behind the ear. The woman, dazed with liquor and her dress stained by blood, was taken into custody. An anonymous telephone report of a "shooting" brought police to the place. On the upper rear porch they found a pool of blood and a small knife. They knocked several times before the stupefied woman admitted them. Keeley was lying on a couch. When asked to explain the blood, she said Keeley had been a frequent caller, and this was confirmed by the man's son, O. C. Keeley, head of the manufacturing company which bears his name. "The older Keeley was sales manager for the company," the son said. Mrs. Keeley died seven years ago and his father had visited Mrs. Jacobs frequently.

Butler Here On Way to Congress

Congressman R. B. Butler, of The Dalles, is in La Grande today visiting friends while he is on his way to Washington, D. C. for this session of the house of representatives. He is well pleased with La Grande, remarking that he has always liked the city. The Eastern Oregon Normal school made a very favorable impression upon the congressman.

Regarding President Hoover's recent suggestion that the state of Oregon take over the federal lands, Mr. Butler has not decided his stand, but he says there is a risk that the state may lose some money in reclamation work should Oregon take charge of the federal lands and afterwards the federal government cease to sponsor such projects. Of course nothing definite can be said as yet, and there are mere possibilities, he said.

STOCK MARKET REGAINS ITS POISE TODAY

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—The stock market which was in a state of despair bordering on panic yesterday, regained its poise today when it became apparent that there was no foundation for the many wild rumors in circulation, and prices rallied briskly under the heavy buying for both accounts. Extreme gains in the active issues ran from 1 to 10 points, with a few high priced specialties marked up 12 to 30 points.

The advance in public utility shares were largely extended in the closing hour. Standard Gas and Electric touched 216 1/2, a jump of 16 1/2 points to a new high. National Biscuit was up 12, Commercial Solvents 12 1/2, Underwood, Elliott Fisher's, Philadelphia Chemical 6 and Adams Express ran off further to 6 1/2, and Marjorie Indors slid down 6 1/2 to 59, new low for the year. The closing was strong, sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.

SHOCK PROVES FATAL
PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 25 (AP)—Mrs. J. F. Ogle, 55, Portland, died suddenly yesterday when informed of the serious injuries suffered by her son, Henry Ogle, 25, employee of a Portland motor company, when he was thrown through the windshield of his car. Ogle is in a hospital suffering from loss of blood and numerous lacerations.

Dr. Shuler is alleged to have delivered an address over his radio at the close of selection of the panel in which he stated the jury was hung before testimony begun and he could name the man who would hang it. Dr. Beigels was accused of making similar accusations from his pulpit in the St. Paul's Presbyterian church. Dr. Shuler, pastor of the Trinity Methodist Episcopal church South, was severely criticized by the grand jury, which declared by broadcast had been based on gossip and hearsay.

The ministers were summoned to appear Monday to show cause why they should not be adjudged in contempt by Judge Hardy.

Jurors Surprise

Jurors expressed surprise that insinuations had been made they would not reach a verdict. They said five ballots had been taken, with the majority favoring conviction of murder in the second degree from the first, and only one voting for acquittal. When a compromise on manslaughter was proposed no difficulty was experienced. Ira F. Gay, the juror against the pastors launched their attack declared he would not comment.

"But I was not the defense juror," he said.

District Attorney Baron Pitts who stepped into the trial only once, to launch a victorious motion for permission to reopen the state's case after prosecutors had been taken by surprise by defense medical experts who testified the Japanese died of asphyxiation, announced his office would "fight to the bitter end" any effort to set aside the verdict.

"My office can say only that the verdict is just in our opinion. We feel it will stand," Pitts said.

\$600,000 IS COST OF NEW COAST ROAD

the Pacific coast from the Canadian border to lower California. Other proponents of the Roosevelt highway were expected to appear before the commission this afternoon, while another group composed of representatives of various coastal Oregon cities through which the highway runs will call on Governor Patterson at Salem, Ore., tomorrow bearing petitions calling for the refunding of highway bonds for the next five years with which to complete the highway.

This were also opened on the Neskevin-Olla section of the Roosevelt highway in Tillamook and Lincoln counties, a project involving 10.9 miles of resurfacing and grading. Awarding of contracts was deferred until later this afternoon, although they were more than a dozen bids submitted the lowest being around \$145,000.

J. B. Malloy of Marshfield, with a bid of \$14,250 and Lelsch and

Taft company, of Marshfield apparently were the lowest bidders on the new bridge which will span Cunningham creek near Coquille, Cook county.

Lelsch and Taft also submitted one of the two bids on 5.7 miles of grading and resurfacing of the Umpqua highway near Reedsport, Douglas county. This contract will be awarded later in the day. Their bid was \$8,323, slightly over what the state engineer had estimated.

\$153,000 Bid Opened
On the Medford-Phoenix route where 5.87 miles of pavement is to be laid, the United Contracting company bid \$153,000 and the Northwest Roads company \$159,015. No action was taken, although commission members announced the contract probably would be let tonight.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—A radio message to the Pan-American Airways today stated that Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh landed at Maracaibo, Venezuela, at 2:35 p. m. from Trinidad.
