WHEAT THREE CENTS HIGHER; CLOSE STRONG

CHICAGO, Sept. 26 (AP)—Much higher Liverpool quotations than looked for, together with greatly curtailed estimates from Australia, led to sharp early upturn today in wheat values here. Wheat in the main areas of what Australia was reported as deteriorating fast. Opening 3/4 to 2 1/4 higher. Chicago wheat later continued to show marked strength. Corn, oats and provisions were also displaying an upward trend, with corn starting 3/4 to 1 1/2 gain, and subsequently holding firm.

Wheat closed strong 2 1/2 to 3 1/4 a bushel higher than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1/4 to 3/8 up, oats 1/4 to 1/2 advanced, and provisions ranging from 5c decline to a rise of 2c.

Butter Market Is Firm In Portland

PORTLAND, Sept. 26 (AP)—The butter market was firm at prices previously established by the Portland produce exchange.

The Pacific cooperative poultry producers still quote fresh extra eggs at 44 cents to wholesalers and 42 cents to retailers.

The first Jonathan apples were being offered retailers at \$2.75 and \$3.25 per box for fancy wrapped stock.

Good tomatoes have advanced to 50 cents a box.
