All the experts agree that the most interesting and colorful season in the south's history is just around the corner with four members of the conference conference elite in the thick of the milling until the championship is decided late in November.

Since the Golden Tornado, conqueror of both California and Notre Dame, caught a staggering blow by the bolting of "Pat" Lumpkin, its great fullback, and the loss through graduation of other star performers, pre-season indications are that the race will develop into a four-cornered affair between the jackets, the mighty Crimson Tide of Alabama, the hustling Volunteers of Tennessee and the brilliant Florida Alligators. Georgia and Vanderbilt, which in years past have occupied positions high in the Dixie sun, now are patient this season while Coach Harry Mahre pounds some experience into a team of up and coming sophomores and Coach Dan McGugin patches up a line that was badly shot by graduates and one thing and another.

So, while Tech, Florida, Alabama and Tennessee supply most of the pre-season pyrotechnics, the wars of 1929 will not be without their threats from other quarters.

The Tulane Green Wave will bear a lot of watching even though the Greenies are long shots, so far as the championship is concerned. Another dark steed in Duke university at Durham, N. C., which is making its bow in the conference.

EARACHE WARNING SIGNAL SHOULD BE HEEDED

Earache is a symptom of trouble in the ear which is accompanied, as a rule, by impairment of hearing, noise in the head described as ringing of bells, or hissing, as of escaping steam or rushing water.

Earache is caused by one of several things. In order of frequency and importance the cause is infection, either of the middle ear cavity or the soft ear canal anterior to the ear drum.

If the middle ear infection is promptly differentiated from the other most frequent thing that causes earache, namely, boils in the external soft ear and is promptly and correctly treated, most of these conditions clear up without permanent impairment of hearing and without progressing to become a menace to health and possibly life.

It is important therefore that instead of resorting to self-treatment that your physician be called without delay after the initial pain or ache in order to determine the cause of the earache.

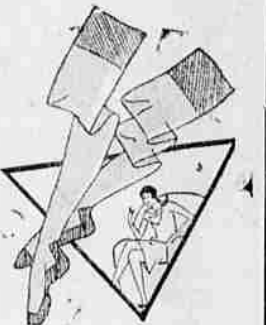

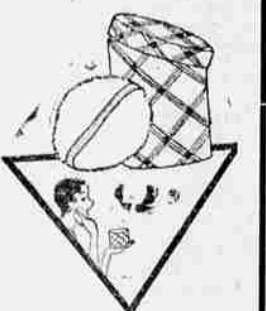
