Prince of Wales Not Anxious To Become a Ruler

LONDON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The breakfast table of England was recently graced by the Prince of Wales, a whole host of it. Had off the press a new intimate biography discusses why the heir to the British throne doesn't marry, whether he will mount the throne and why he is shy.

The reviews fill big space in the newspapers, the publisher stipulated with the authors that the narrative should be both correct and in good taste and before the book was published it was submitted to the prince's secretary, Sir Godfrey Thomas. Much material was supplied from the palace, it is stated.

On a topic for gossip on five continents and seven seas, marriage, the author says:

"Retaining the best of so-called old-fashioned beliefs in his creed of moderation, the prince is a firm disciple of the belief that there is no use in marrying without love. Because he has not yet experienced that emotion in its true intensity, the prince does not get married. That is all there is to it."

The prince is credited with keeping an album in which he notes clippings from newspapers on the rumors and reports circulated about his supposed engagements. The prediction of the late king Edward VII is recalled to the effect that the present Prince or

Wales would be the last king of England. Reference also is made to the frequent suggestion made in England that the prince himself is not enthusiastic toward the prospect of becoming a sovereign. After a steep climb in which the prince had ridden a farmer who was not aware of his identity accosted him and asked if the Prince of Wales had won.

"The latter told the farmer, 'No he fell.'"

"He will break his neck one of these days," the farmer said. "Well," replied the prince, "it is his own neck so it doesn't matter."

Pulse Rate
