## Stocks Decline Drastically In Exchange Today

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)—

Stock prices declined drastically under a flood of selling on the New York exchange today. Bullish demonstrations in a few issues were unavailing. Toward the close, professional support was withdrawn, and about a score of issues suffered extreme losses of about \$8 to \$25 a share.

Short covering failed to cause appreciable rallies in the final dealings. The decline was in reflection of the unexpected increase of \$192,000,000 in brokers' loans, which was widely interpreted as indicating that stock had been passing from strong to weak hands. Auburn auto, a rather mercurial issue, tumbled \$25 a share to \$420. U. S. Steel dropped \$9.25 to \$222.50, which is nearly \$40 under its record price of a few weeks ago. Columbian Carbon dropped \$19 and such issues as American Telephone, General Electric, Eastman Kodak, American Can, Du Pont, Johns Manville, Columbia Gas, A. M. Byers, Westinghouse Electric, and Simmons lost from \$7 to \$12. The close was weak. Sales approximated 4,400,000 shares.

## WHEAT CLOSES HEAVY, 2 CENTS LOWER TODAY

CHICAGO, Sept. 27 (AP)—With some rains reported in Australia, and with Liverpool quotations undergoing a setback, wheat values here showed an irregular downward trend early today. Stocks of wheat abroad were asserted to be sufficient to last importing countries for some time. Owing to unchanged to 1/2 off, Chicago wheat later suffered a general decline. Corn and oats were also easier, with corn starting at 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, and subsequently sagging all around. Provisions held steady.

Wheat closed heavy 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 c. higher than yesterday's final. Corn closed 1/2 to 2 1/2 c. down, oats 1/2 to 3/4 off, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 20c.

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**Eggs Are Aiming  
At Winter Level;  
Butter Is Firm**

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27 (AP)—Eggs appear to be headed toward their winter value of levels. Top grades have advanced another two cents. The price to retailers is 46 and to wholesalers 44. Other grades were unchanged.

The Portland produce exchange has made no changes in latter prices for some time. The product is firm at present quotations.

Corn and tomatoes, which recently had swamped the East Side market, were advancing.

Tomatoes ranged from 35 to 45 cents and corn from 80 to 90 cents a bushel.

Cracking cucumbers are getting scarcer, the choicest sizes going as

"Of 4,000,000 pounds of wool offered in the Albuquerque sale, about 15 per cent was carried over. Prices at the close noted in the clean range landed Boston of 75 to 80 cents, mostly. Some brought a little more.

"The piecegoods market is waiting. There is reason to believe that a very decent volume of business impends, contingent upon a stable market being seen.

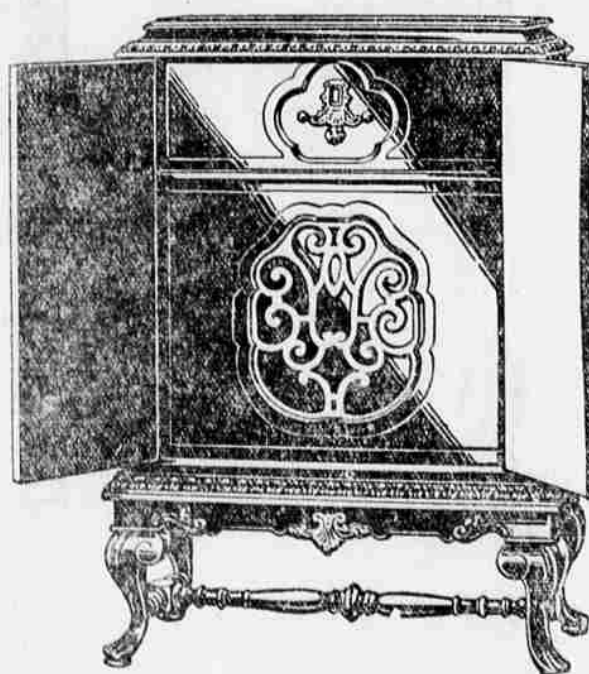

## MAN'S GREAT SPEED CREATES TORNADO

vertex. "That's how fast the funnel whirled around.

In Oriskany's flight the plane had the velocity, but if the pilot had stuck his hand out of the cockpit, the consequences probably would have been the same as when a twister hits a fence post.

Oriskany's speed was approximately a mile in 10 seconds.

"It wouldn't be safe to travel in anything faster than seven miles a second," says Dr. Pogran, who is dean of Columbia's engineering school. "The traveler would fly off the earth into infinity." And, he might have added, eternally.

The all-time, open speed record of the universe seems to be held by light, which travels at about 186,000 miles a second.

The alpha rays of radium are pretty fast, but they leap into space at only approximately one-twentieth of light's velocity.

Sound waves, of course, are slower, moving at the approximate rate of a mile in five seconds. The bullet from a .30 caliber Springfield rifle is much swifter, leaving the muzzle at 2,600 feet a second.

It has been estimated that the fastest a person can fall from a great height is 112 miles an hour, but a pair of binoculars dropped from the 722-foot tower of the Woodworth building would smash

on Broadway in three and one-half seconds.

As for earth-bound creatures and creations, the automobile at this writing apparently has not exceeded 206.95 miles an hour, railroad trains about 120 miles, speedboats 92.1 miles, the horse a mile in 1 minute 32.45 seconds, and man himself 100 yards in 9.4 seconds.
