CARS ABROAD
SETS RECORD

Shattering an all-time record in
the history of the company, Dodge

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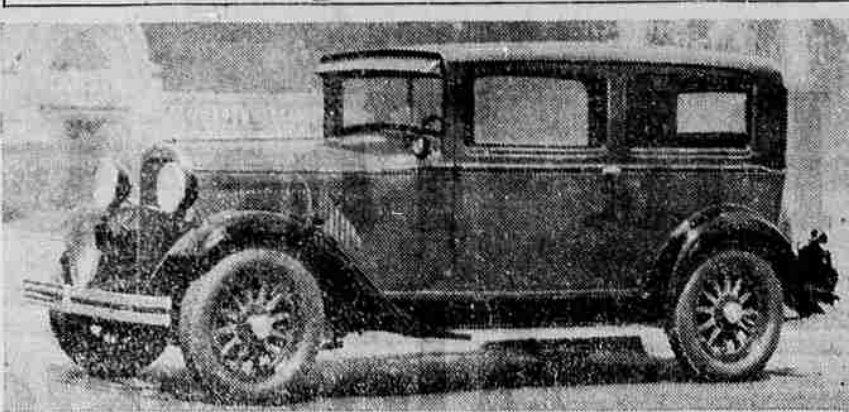

Unlocked Cars
Are Temptation
To The Robber

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 28.—The
promiscuous manner in which cars
are left unlocked on the streets and
highways of this state is contribut-
ing to juvenile delinquency, is caus-
ing an upward trend in crime and
is responsible for many heartaches
and heavy property losses, accord-
ing to Joe E. Shelton, manager of
the Oregon State Motor associa-
tion, who makes a special appeal
to parents to lock their vehicles
so that children may be kept out
of temptation.
"Police records show that on the

West coast the professional car
thief's operations are negligible,
with more than ninety per cent of
the stolen vehicles being taken by
non-professionals, who use the cars
for immediate purposes and then
abandon them," Mr. Shelton says.
"These purposes range from pure
joy riding to major crimes.
"The youngster who is able to
steal a car at will, use it as he
wishes and then abandon it, with-
out penalty of law, has passed the
first step in the field of crime and
is well on his way toward a career
which will end behind prison bars.
"Shelton does the young car thief
tanner with a locked vehicle be-
cause he knows that the next ma-
chine probably will be unlocked
and therefore can be driven off
with ease.
"The one remedy for this serious
condition is public co-operation.
Parents, above all others, should
realize the importance of keeping
children out of temptation by care-

tully locking their cars at all
times," Mr. Shelton concluded.

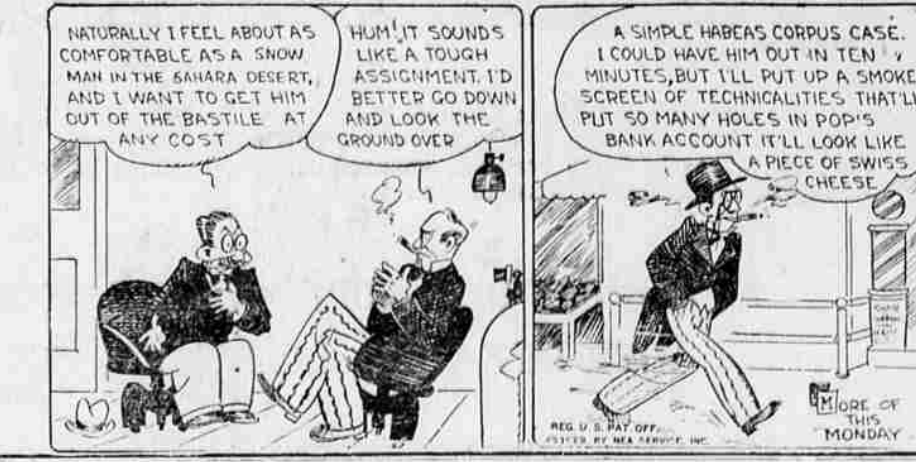
