## MENUS

Perhaps of all the pies made, pumpkin is the most popular. It's almost the only variety commonly included among the party refreshments and it seems such a personal kind of pie. Everybody has his own very definite ideas of just what a pumpkin pie should be from color to taste.

The color of the finished pie depends largely on the amount of spices used, of course, but unless the pumpkin is stewed down until perfectly dry and is a good color to begin with, that rich traditional golden brown cannot be attained.

The pumpkin can be baked, steamed or stewed. To bake, wash and cut in halves. Scrape out seeds and place in dripping pan, cut side down. Bake in a moderate oven until tender. The moisture will fall from the pump-

baking molasses, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 2 to 2 1/2 cups milk.

Mix sugar, flour, salt and spices. Add to pumpkin and stir until thoroughly blended. Add molasses and egg well beaten. Mix well and stir in milk. The amount of milk depends on the size of the pie dish. Turn into a pie dish lined with plain pastry. Put into a hotoven for ten minutes to set the crust. Reduce heat and bake in a moderate oven for 50 minutes.

This amount of filling will fill a pie dish seven inches in diameter at the bottom and 1 1/2 inches deep.

**Fluffy Pumpkin Pie**

Three-fourths cup sifted pumpkin, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1/2 cup cream, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Beat yolks of eggs with sugar, salt and spices. Add pumpkin, milk and cream and mix thoroughly. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and fold into first mixture. Turn into a pie dish lined with pastry and bake as in preceding recipe.

If a highly spiced pie is liked, more spices can be added to either rule.
