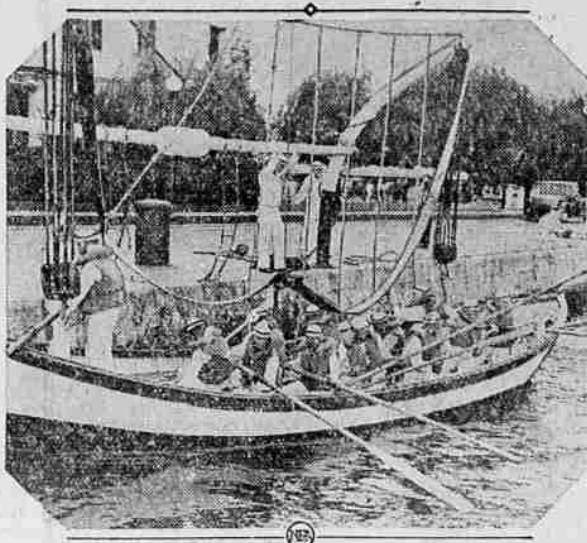

Legionnaires In Convention At Louisville, Ky.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 29 (AP)—The eleventh annual convention of the national American Legion was called to order at the Jefferson county armory here this morning by Commander Paul V. McNutt, of Indiana. Approximately 50,000 legionnaires, members of their families and visitors were assembled in

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Louisville as the convention opened and additional thousands continued to pour into the city during the day. Until an agreement for real navy-cruiser building program should be continued, said Commander McNutt in his annual report made public at the opening session. Asserting that the legion stands for movements to make permanent peace more certain, Commander McNutt added that until such methods are found and accepted by all nations "this nation must provide a complete defense in any contingency."
