SHEARER ON STAND TODAY IN NAVY

(Continued from Page 1)

When he was before the committee Mr. Schwab said he did not recall the meetings which Shearer said took place in the Ritz Carlton and that he did not even know Mr. Horner.

Then Shearer said he saw Frederick P. Palen, vice president of the Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock corporation.

"Then I called on Mr. Horner in New York and he introduced me to Mr. Wakeman," continued the witness. "I was talking a merchant marine publicity campaign to them."

"Mr. Wakeman said the idea of a campaign is good but we want action in Washington and we think you should go to Washington to try and get action at the 59th congress on the cruiser bill."

Shearer said he was then employed for \$7,500 for the publicity work and to cover the period of three short sessions of congress.

Shearer said he did not recall how he was paid.

"I am only interested in getting cash," he added, "and I am not much interested in how I get it."

After the \$7,500 job was over in March, 1927, Shearer related, he met in Hunter's office with the shipbuilders and arranged to go to Geneva.

Wakeman and Burke were there. Shearer then outlined his oral contract with the shipbuilders as follows:

"They were delighted with the idea of events in Washington. They wanted me to get to Geneva just as quickly as I could. I was to receive an advance of \$25,000 with the understanding that

this was to be continuous. My employment was to be continuous."

Shearer testified his salary for "continuous employment" was not fixed, but that the shipbuilders gave him a letter of credit for \$7,500 at the meeting on March 7, 1927.

"They announced they had paid me \$15,000 but had never met very much out of it—or very little," he added.

"I had letters in 1926—a year previous—from almost every patriotic society of America, including one from the Native Sons of California," he said, directing his remarks to Shortridge of California.

The witness recalled that he had spoken before the California legislature and "voiced your views," Senator Shortridge, that you are not only a Nationalist but for nationalization.

Shortridge said he was in Geneva about five months in 1926 "for myself." He asserted that in 1926 Albin K. Johnson, Geneva correspondent for the New York World, tried to sell him British information.

Seeing suddenly, Shearer said that once when he proposed naval bases for the navy, Senator King, Democrat, Utah, asked me to get one for Salt Lake City. At this the committee insisted that Shearer confine his remarks to the Geneva story.

"But that's so," he persisted. "And why did Senator King go into the press about me?"

Shearer, the \$25,000 observer for American shipbuilders at the 1927 Geneva naval limitations conference testified today before a senate committee that no member of the American delegation had wished to see the party and to failure and that he did not claim he had broken up the gathering.

"Do you know of anyone of our representatives who worked against arriving at an agreement?" asked Chairman Shortridge.

"He introduced the political clause which was for another naval building holiday,"

He did not give this person's name.

Shearer said he himself was for the American program for parity with the British navy, that if he had not been, he would have been with the British, who wanted 750,000 tons of cruisers.

of the New Testament

"Jesus is revealed as the 'Son of God' and the 'Son of man,'" the pastor said Sunday night. "His teachings, wonderful works, and holy life and heart is evidence of his divinity. The historical record of his life, which is as clear in history, to say the least, as that of any other person whose acts have been recorded, cannot be gained or doubted. Here we have the pen portrait of the Son of God living in the person of the son of man among men and women like us, giving to us both a comprehensive and a satisfying revelation of God, with the evidence, teaching, discipline, love, sympathy, mercy, forgiveness and salvation from the divine one which the heart hungers for, and for which it has always sought in the whole history of man."

If he is the Son of God he inherits all things from God—all that is God's is his, and if he is the son of man he inherits all things from man—all that is man's is his. If through disobedience man lost all, then through obedience Christ gained all, so that all our lost possessions, both in time and eternity, falls by inheritance to him, and through him is again returned to us. And this is the gospel call, the 'good tidings of great joy, which shall be for all people,' that all who believe in him shall be saved—adopted into the family of God, 'heirs of God, and joint heirs with Christ.'"

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Liquid Air

Several scientists had a part in the discovery of liquid air, among them being the two Poles, Sigmond Wroblewski and Karl Olszewski, who on April 8, 1883, at Cracow, performed an experiment in which they actually produced a few drops of liquid air. The French scientists, Callot and Fictet, performed experiments in the same year that also produced liquid air.

Means Hard Worker
"Robot" is a Czechish word, which means, literally, a very hard working man doing heavy manual labor. The word came into use in "R. U. R." a play by a Czechish writer, Capek, and was applied to a mechanical man.

Quicksand Formation
Quicksand is a loose sand into which solid bodies readily sink. It is composed of water worn and rounded particles which under ordinary pressure pack together, and behave like a fluid when moistened. When heavy objects are pressed upon the surface, they are very quickly swallowed up.

Variation in Headstones
