MENUS

The fact that sweet potatoes live up to their name and contain a large amount of sugar makes them an excellent energy-producing food.

Compared with Irish potatoes, the food value is higher in fat and carbohydrates but lower in protein. One-half of a baked sweet potato provides one hundred calories while one whole medium-sized baked Irish potato is needed to furnish the hundred calories portion. Both sweet and Irish potatoes are excellent carriers for fat, since their palatability depends much on a generous seasoning of butter.

The vitamin content of sweet potatoes is lower than that of white. Vitamin A is present in considerable quantity and vitamin B is found in small amounts, while little is known about the vitamin C content. The mineral content is lower, also, but when these deficiencies are made up by other food stuffs, "sugar spuds" offer an appetizing change from white potatoes. Plain baked or boiled, they can be eaten by children over two years of age.

When sweet potatoes have appeared in the main course, a dessert that is not very sweet should be chosen. Fresh fruit or a fruit whip, custard or ice is suitable. It takes longer to bake sweet

potatoes than white ones. One and a half hours should be allowed for their baking.

Sweet potatoes are an extremely perishable vegetable and for this reason can't be purchased in as large a quantity as the hardy Irish varieties.

Sweet potatoes make excellent desserts. Boiled with the skins on, they are mashed, seasoned with butter, milk and a little salt and baked in individual cups with a marshmallow on top to make a sweet dessert for small children.

Sweet potato pie is very good and much like pumpkin pie. It requires less sugar, but must be quite highly seasoned.

Sweet Potato Pie
One cup of cooked and mashed sweet potato, 2 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon salt.

Beat eggs with sugar and milk until light. Add salt, spices and butter to mashed potato and mix well. Add beaten eggs and milk, slowly beating to make smooth. Turn into a deep pie pan lined with plain pastry and bake fifty minutes in a moderate oven. When firm to the touch, the pie is done.

Detective Shot To Death; Police Seeking Slayer

HAVRE DE GRACE, Md., Oct. 1 (AP)—Authorities with nothing more tangible than a discarded pistol to work from, are searching for the assassin who late last night shot and killed A. A. Morrison, of New York, Pinkerton detective assigned to the Havre De Grace race track, while he was on his way home through a darkened street. Morrison, according to several persons who saw the fatal shooting, was accosted by the man, who said "now I've got you," fired six shots into his body and fled. Morrison died five minutes after being admitted to a hospital without regaining consciousness. The bystanders told police they heard the words of the man, the shots, and saw the wounded man fall, but did not get a clear look at the killer. Later, however, two negroes said they had seen a man running from the scene of the shooting, and that he had thrown a pistol into a clump of bushes. The pistol, with all cartridges discharged, was found by Police Chief Clifford Santmeyer.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 1 (AP)—Julian Strait, in charge of criminal investigation work in the sheriff's office, has been dropped from the payroll. Economy is given by Sheriff Brown as the reason for his action. He has been exceeding his budget, he said. Strait is one of the best known criminal deputies in this section of Oregon.
