Sights and sounds of the largest Negro city in the world, New York's Harlem, are brought to the talking screen in "Thunderbolt." George Bancroft's all-talking picture which the Arcade theater will feature for three days of the week, starting today. Josef von Sternberg, who directed Bancroft in "Underworld," made "Thunderbolt," a story of a hard-fighting man who lives outside the law in the hidden places of the Negro district.
