

SUPREME COURT TERM OPEN OCT 7

Leading Fall Case Schedule Involves Right of Radio Station.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP) — The supreme court will open its regular fall term, October 7 with a further reduction from former years in the number of cases docketed and an almost complete absence of controversies of national importance before it.

Probably the most important issue is presented by the federal radio commission, a comparatively new government body which has not had its powers defined by the highest tribunal.

The question is important for broadcasting stations as well as for the public. It comes to the supreme court through the medium of station WGY at Schenectady, broadcasting time of which is restricted by the commission. The station appealed to the District of Columbia court of appeals and received an order under which it has continued to operate on a full-time basis. The commission petitioned for a review.

Prohibition cases, which formerly occupied numerous places on the docket, have fallen off considerably as nearly every ratification of the dry laws has been disposed of by opinion or by the refusal of the court to grant petitions for review.

There are several controversies between states. The state of New Jersey seeks to prevent New York from tapping the headwaters of the Delaware river and from dumping refuse into the Atlantic of the New Jersey shore and also asks the boundary line with Delaware be changed to mid-channel of the Delaware river and bay instead of at the low water mark on the Jersey shore.

Vermont and New Hampshire, Texas and Oklahoma, and Louisiana and Mississippi are involved in other boundary disputes. Water rights issues have been raised by Colorado against Kansas; by Connecticut against Massachusetts; and between the federal government and Utah.

Other questions presented include: The validity of Nebraska's order that a railroad build a private crossing for a farmer.

The validity of reduced rates on California's deciduous fruits. The right of the Federal Trade Commission to control the use of descriptive names as trade names. The constitutionality of the Missouri law prohibiting screens which do not allow a view from the sidewalk into certain stores.

The constitutionality of the Louisiana law prohibiting animal racing on tracks less than one mile in length.

The right of Baltimore and Los Angeles street car companies to raise fares.

Whether former Rep. Harry M. Wurzback of Texas unlawfully used contributions in his campaign for re-election as charged by the government.

Whether brewers whose establishments were closed following the prohibition act had the right to deduct the value of lost good will in making out income tax returns.

Whether a father had the right to remove the body of his child from a Roman Catholic graveyard in the Philippines.

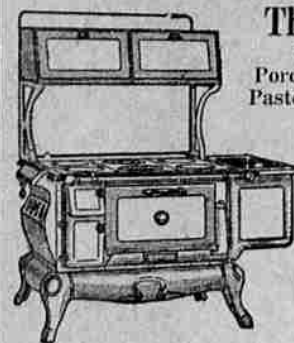

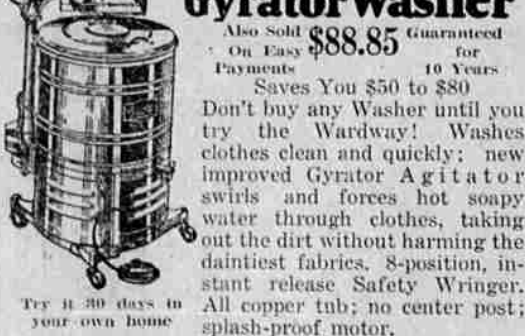
