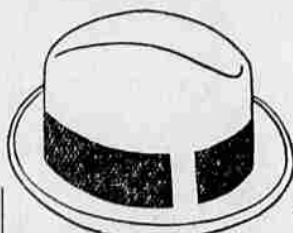

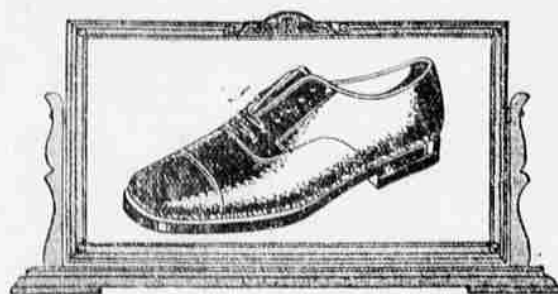

It was announced here. The MacMarr company recently acquired the Shodgrass Food company, operating grocery stores in Colorado and New Mexico.

The MacMarr group now will include approximately 1,350 stores.

PROGRESS MADE

CHICAGO, Oct. 2 (AP)—The National Marketing corporation, a proposed 20,000,000 dollar concern, the purpose of which will be to cooperate with the federal farm board as it extends marketing aid to grain farmers, may be a working reality within a week. It was revealed today by William H. Settle of Indianapolis, chairman of the committee authorized to effect the corporation's setup.

Settle's statement was made as he and a special subcommittee of three went into session with two members of the farm board. The purpose of today's meeting was to iron out differences of opinion the farm board and cooperatives might hold on the corporation's bylaws.

Now major changes in the setup, already outlined by the subcommittee, were anticipated. The subcommittee was authorized to make minor changes and was expected to complete its work soon.

In the event the farm board demands no major changes, the special committee of 16 cooperatives will be reconvened immediately as a board of directors and the new farm organization will be incorporated under the laws of Delaware, he said. Settle said he expected the corporation to be functioning within 20 days, preceding the members of the farm board agreed at the present conference on the marketing policy.

Source of Shot Unknown

The source of the first shot was not definitely learned. Sheriff Adkins said that he did not know where the first shot came from but that he thought it came from the picket line. He said that a number of those wounded had been shot down by their own people, asserting that one man standing beside him fell as a number of shots were sent in his direction.
