## Trojans Making Ready for O. S. C.

### Coach Howard Jones Polishing Off New Power and Pass Plays.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2 (AP)—The polishing off of a number of new power and pass plays in preparation for the invasion of Coach Paul Schissler's Oregon State football eleven Saturday, was the task before Coach Howard Jones, University of Southern California gridiron performer today.

The need for more perfect execution of these formations was evident after yesterday's scrimmage, which lasted until Harvard field was swallowed by darkness.

While the Trojans made fair progress against the Spartans yesterday, timing and precision was lacking and the gains made were short and ineffective except some expert end runs and off tackle punts by Jess Hill, substitute fullback.

**Praises Hill**  
Jones praised Hill's performance. "Hill is one of the speediest and quickest half backs I've ever had," he said.

To top off a good day the Trojan speedster kicked the only point after touchdown made on three scores against the Spartans. His punts, at quarterback, made some nice lateral passes, but few of them found receivers.

What success the variety had against the freshmen and intercollegiate on the offensive was all but wiped by their defense put up against some of Coach Schissler's pet plays. The Spartans passed and plunged through the Trojan defenses for several nice gains.

The long scrimmage necessitated the master Oregon State formations delayed offensive practice until almost dark.

## INFIELDS NOT AS STRONG AS 1910

Cubs, However, Believed to Have Slight Advantage Over Mackmen.

By Alan Gould (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—The last time the Athletics and Cubs met in the world's series, 19 years ago, they presented two of the greatest infield combinations of all time. Time has enhanced rather than dimmed the fame of the Tinker-Evers-Charles' double-play trio and the famous Davis-Collins-Harry-Baker quartet of 1910.

Neither of the infields that take their positions at Wrigley field next Tuesday compared as a whole with those ancient arrays. From an individual standpoint, however, the Cubs have one of the greatest performers of all time in Horsey Hornsby while the Athletics have a great youngster in Jimmy Foxg. Frank Baker was the home run hero of his day and chance as slugger but neither had anything like the hitting punch of Hornsby and Foxg.

**The Usual 'G's.**  
"If" Charlie Grimm, the Cub field captain, is recovered sufficiently from a broken left wrist to be back in top form, Jim McElroy's infield troupe figures to have a slight defensive edge on their Mack rivals as well as a margin in hitting strength.

"If" the double-play figures mean anything, the Cubs have a more effective combination, for they have registered over 140 twin killings as compared to around 115 for the Athletics. At the Cub infielders have an advantage of about 10 points to the man with Foxg and Dykes. Hornsby and English topping their rivals by substantial margins.

Foxg is a much more dangerous batsman than Grimm but the Cub captain is a consistent hitter, a more finished fielder and more experienced. Grimm was signed by Connie Mack when he was a kid of 17 back in 1918, but he never got a trial with the A's. This is his last year in the league season and Foxg's fifth.

**Bishop Good in Pitches.**  
Max Bishop, the senior Mack second baseman, has a habit of rising to the occasion. He might turn out to be a series hero but his record cannot compare with that of his great rival, Hornsby. Bishop may be a better man at going back after puns, flies but Hornsby has had a great year in the field as well as at bat. His batting mark is 140 points better than Bishop's and his experience is a vital Cub asset.

Joe Boley, out of the game a good part of the season, is a smooth-working shortstop than the 22-year-old Elwood English, but not so good a hitter. The versatile Jimmy Dyke, who can play any infield position acceptably, gives the A's a distinct edge at third base. Norman McMillan is just what he has filled a spot that gave the Cubs a lot of early worry but the ex-Yankee is not so seasoned or as dangerous a hitter as Dyke.
