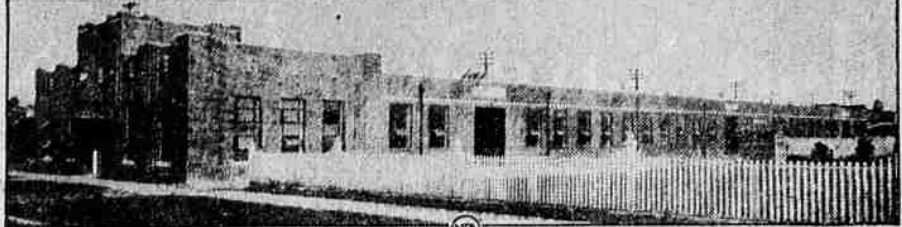

Rival Unions Push Organization Of Southern Cotton Mill Workers

CHARLOTTE, N. C. (AP)—The industrial growth of the south during the last decade has brought the second phase of industrialization—labor organization.

Many sections of the south have been transformed into great factory areas. This is especially true in the Piedmont area of the Carolinas where hundreds of cotton spinning weaving and finishing mills have sprung up.

These plants are manned entirely by native white labor. Until a few months ago the workers remained independent and, in most instances, refused to have a connection with labor organizations. Negroes do not work in the mills except as janitors and on similar jobs.

The mills prospered and there was little trouble between employers and workers. Ten years ago there was a textile strike in the section around Concord, Kannapolis and Charlotte with 15,000 workers out.

A slump came after the war, when cotton gins refused to buy cotton. Many mills attempted to operate part time but overproduction pushed prices downward. Mill owners sought a way out. Efficiency experts were called in. They introduced changes, some of which increased the number of looms on spindles cared for by each worker.

Strikes began in the South Carolina valley. At Greenville, Spartanburg, Anderson, Union and other centers thousands of employees walked out. They were not yet
