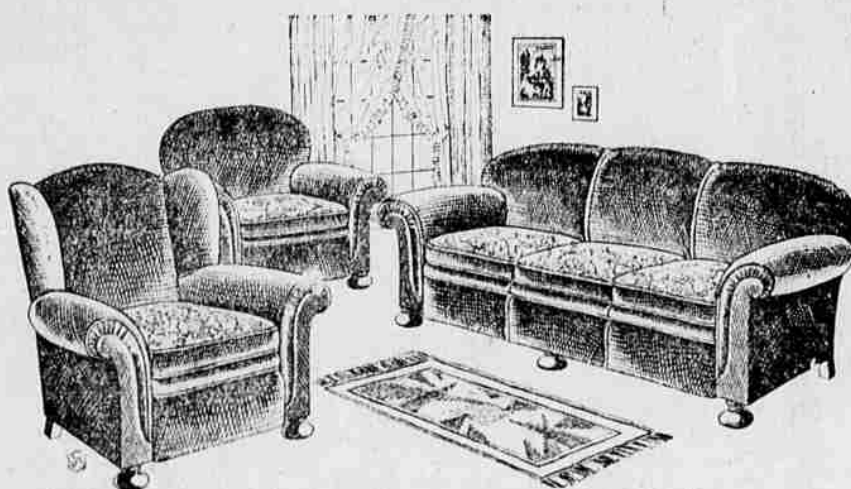
The skink is a small animal, the length of a hand, resembling the alligator lizard, and able to change color at will.

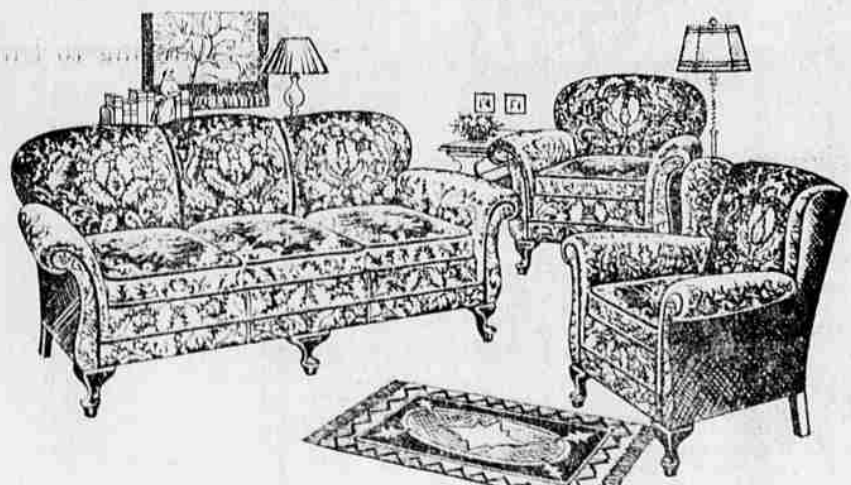

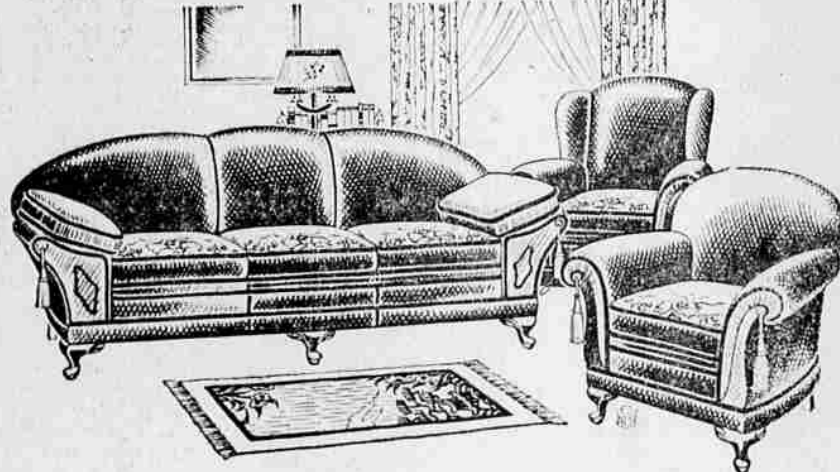

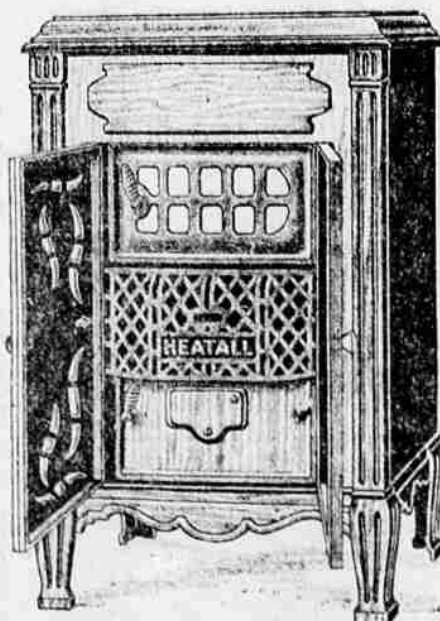
