With the Prunes—

The prune business is fairly humming over at Union now with several packing plants going strong. Things are looking more encouraging for prune growers and according to one packer growers have the prospect of making some little money this year, to say nothing of the money being put into circulation through the gathering and marketing of the crop. Things are going more rapidly now than the Idaho prunes have been practically all marketed. At the association packing plant in Union about 55 people are employed, with two belts running all the time. This group packs out about 235 car loads of prunes per day, more than 20 cars having already been shipped. About 1700 boxes make a car load. John Dean is packing near Union, having secured new quarters this year. Stocklands have two plants running, one adjacent to the post office and the other at the Tom Adams farm near Union. Stocklands are packing out about a car and a half per day. Next week will probably see the finish of most of the prune business in this county, it is said.

A Seasonable Recipe

Peach Cream Pie
One teaspoon cornstarch.
One cup thin cream.
Two egg yolks.
One-half cup sugar.
One and one-half cups peach pulp.
One teaspoon vanilla.
Two teaspoons lemon juice.
Cook cornstarch and cream in a double boiler until thick; mix the egg yolks and add the peach pulp and flavoring. You may use either the fresh peaches or the canned ones; however, the fresh are the better. Pour this mixture slowly into the cream. Cook for five minutes, then fill a baked pastry shell. Cover with a meringue made with the two egg whites and brown in the oven.
