**Portland, Ore., Oct. 7**—Four football games of major importance in the championship of the Pacific Coast conference teams will be played this weekend. Since the opening tilt of the conference season furnished a surprise or two in football circles, each game for next Saturday has assumed a great or aspect.

Two elevens, heralded as the most powerful teams in the northwest, ran into trouble last Saturday, and one, Washington, will find the going still more difficult this Saturday. The Huskies, rejuvenated after the miserable showing at the start of last season, began the 1929 season with another slow start. Montana, the victor of the conference, gathered enough power last week to hold the Huskies to a tie at 6-6.

**Trojans Real Threat**  
If Washington had trouble with Montana, there probably will be no end to the trouble offered by U. C. L. A. at Seattle Saturday. The Trojans made a whirlwind opening knocking over U. C. L. A. by the margin conference score of 76 to 9, and then continued the advance toward the title by winning from Oregon State, 21 to 0. Comparing the early season starts of both teams, the hope is heavily in favor of a Trojan victory at Seattle.

The Idaho-Montana game, which will be played at Moscow, has increased in importance a hundred-fold since the Grizzlies' strong showing against Washington. Major Millburn declared at the outset of the conference practice season that the Montana team was the best one produced in that section of the country in several seasons. His prediction has been true so far, and the game with the Vandals, who will be playing their first conference game of the year, should be a real battle.

**Husks to Go South**  
California and Washington State will get into the championship race when they clash at Berkeley Saturday. The Cougars have defeated two teams of minor caliber, while the Bears have won from Utah and Oregon. This game, too, is one of the key games of the season, with the hope being toward California. In the other conference tilt, Stanford should have no trouble in downing the Ucla Bruins.

Oregon and Oregon State, after losing their starts in conference competition, will take on a couple of easier teams to relieve the strain before going up against tough opposition again in two weeks. Oregon will meet Willamette at Eugene and Oregon State will play Columbia university at Portland. The Willamettes were disappointing in their opening defeat at the hands of the Cardinals, while Oregon State showed flashes of high football in holding down the high-scoring Trojan team.

**Bigger Press Box At Wrigley Field**

CHICAGO, Oct. 7 (AP)—So great has been the demand for press seats for world series games to be played at Wrigley field, starting tomorrow, that the press box has been enlarged to accommodate 412 writers and telegraphers.

Ninety-six telegraph wires have been strung into the press stand. These will be handled by 105 operators and supervisors.

The booths from which six daily newspapers will bark their accounts of the games will be located in a section near front row seats.

**No Upsets Occur In Big 10 Grid Games Saturday**

CHICAGO, Oct. 7 (AP)—Without a real upset to complicate the situation, western conference football games, with the exception of Indiana, breezed through practice games Saturday, each coming out on the right side of the score and sharpened for the start of the championship race next Saturday.

Eight of the ten teams in the conference will tangle in four tilt games this weekend, with Northwestern meeting Wisconsin at Madison, leading in playing Chicago at State field, Iowa with Ohio State at Columbus and Michigan meeting Purdue at Lafayette. Minnesota will engage Vanderbilt at Minneapolis, while Illinois will have Bradley on its foe in another polishing up contest.

The four championship games figure to be tough ones, particularly at this early stage of the season, with the losing eleven facing the possibility of elimination as contenders.

The results of Saturday's games shed little light on what to expect next Saturday. Indiana was not strong enough to stop Steve Dimeo, with Ikeek's men of speed emerging victorious, 14 to 9. Jack Eider, Notre Dame's famous splitter, beat Indiana almost single-handed, scoring both touchdowns.

Illinois hit Ten champions for the last two seasons, smashed out on easy 25 to 0 victory over Kansas.

Zuppke kept six of his first string men out because of injuries, but managed to tie up 20 other able-bodied youths to conquer the Jayhawkers.

Colgate gave Wisconsin a scare in the first half, but the second half was something else, with the Bluejays emerging with a 13-0 victory.

Portland, However, Ends Regular Season for Stars by Defeating 'em.

Baseball fans fought over again today the final games of one of the closest finishes in Pacific coast league history while the San Francisco Mission Reds and Hollywood Stars mopped out their strategy for a championship playoff beginning here tomorrow.

Winnies respectively of the first and second halves of the split season, the Mission Reds and Stars will meet tomorrow in the opening contest of a seven game series to determine the 1929 pennant. **Coste Exceeds Distance Flight Mark 1800 Miles**

TRIPPING CHINA, Oct. 7 (AP)—A telegram received by the French consul at Harbin, Manchuria, from Captain Dieudonne Coste, French aviator, says he and Jacques Deloche, in their plane the "25," covered 9,810 kilometers (about 6,100 miles) on their long trip from Le Bourget to Manchuria last week.

This estimate is 1,500 miles in excess of the previous long distance flying record, established by the Italian aviators, Ferrarin and Del Prete, in 1925, of 4,358 miles.

Captain Coste's telegram was sent from Tsinibar, Manchuria, and said they had landed safely in a desert section of Hellingking province Sunday, Sept. 23, and had been able to reach Tsinibar only yesterday. They left Le Bourget Friday, Sept. 27.

Their flight established the first nonstop air communication between France and China. The French consul at Harbin, M. Raymond, left immediately for Tsinibar to assist them to obtain fuel and make necessary minor repairs to they could continue their flight. Their original destination was Vladivostok, Siberia.

**Fair Weather Is Due For Chicago**

CHICAGO, Oct. 7 (AP)—The weather man, after going into a huddle with his instruments today, held out promise of generally fair weather with not much change in temperature, for the opening game of the world series tomorrow.

If there is no drop in the temperature, it will be around 69 or 70 degrees at the start of the game. With chilling winds sweeping off Lake Michigan, however, light forecasts probably will feel comfortable.

**LEW FONSECA WINS JUNIOR LEAGUE TITLE**

CLEVELAND, Oct. 7 (AP)—"The Portuguese" Fonseca, who came back after major league clubs discarded him only to find himself slated for nothing better than utility roles, won the American league batting championship, on 100 hits of official records.

Fonseca, the Cleveland Indians' first baseman, finished the season yesterday with an unofficial average of .329, just five points better than Al Simmons of Philadelphia. He brought the title his first batting championship since Tris Speaker's ring up 458 in 1916.

He started his career in 1920 with the San Francisco Seals. Fonseca, who is 25 years old, was born at Oakland, Cal. He drifted into baseball by accident, having trained several years to go on the concert stage.

**McCarty To Pitch Root In Opener**

CHICAGO, Oct. 7 (AP)—Manager Joe McCarthy of the Cubs today said he planned to send Charlie Root, his star right hander, against the Athletics in the first game of the world series tomorrow, reserving Percy "Pat" Malone for the second game Wednesday.

Root, leading pitcher of the National league this season, was selected by McCarthy because of his greater steadiness. He is a fast ball pitcher and a very fast work man. Root won 19 games and lost 6 this year.
