 charges which the outside district now pays for.
 Mr. Merry said that increased real estate values and increased prospects for new industries would result from a boundary extension, thus benefiting the city as a whole.
 Mr. Stoddard, who is in favor of coming in, said that one of the big questions people outside are asking is: "What assurance have we that we would receive city improvements, such as sewers, water mains, etc., were we to come in?" Personally, he said that it would save him about \$40 a year to come in, this including taxes that he would have to pay within the city boundaries.

Supplies of cauliflower and head lettuce were heavy; a few mixed cars were loaded, and prices on the Portland wholesale market low.

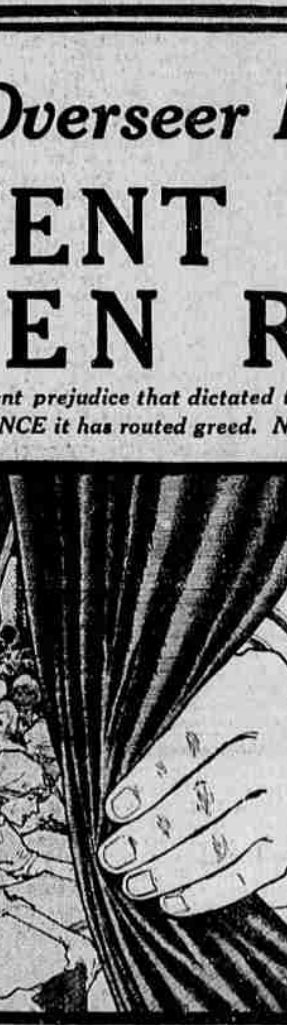
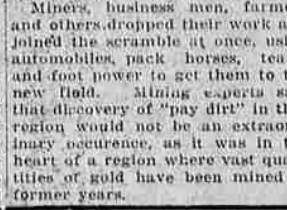
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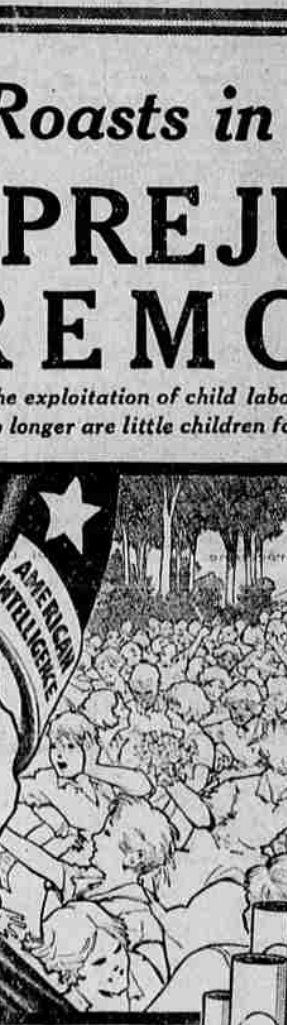
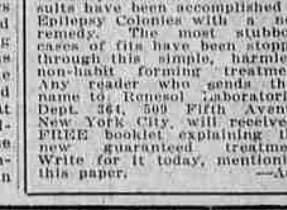
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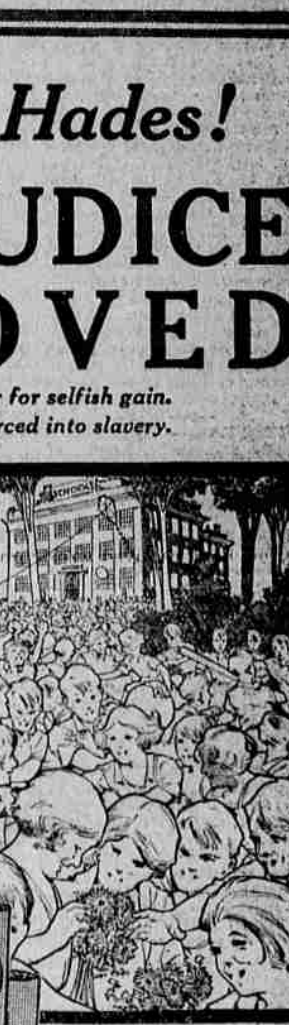
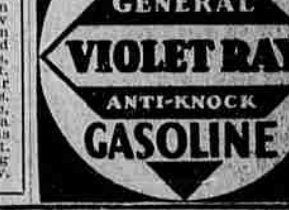
