SUMMONS IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON FOR UNION COUNTY

State of Oregon, represented and acting by I. L. Patterson, Governor, Hal E. Hoss, Secretary of State, George A. White, Adjutant General, Edward F. Bailey and W. C. North, comprising the World War Veterans State Aid Commission of the State of Oregon, Plaintiff

vs. Fred Murray, Golda B. Murray, his wife, G. F. Hall and Percy Little, Defendants.

TO: Percy Little, one of the above named defendants. IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the amended complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause, on or before the 5th day of November, 1929, the said date being the last day of the four weeks period prescribed by this summons.

And if you fail to answer said amended complaint or otherwise plead herein, for want thereof, the above named plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in its complaint, to-wit:

For judgment and decree against the defendant, Fred Murray, for the sum of \$2226.55, together with interest thereon at the rate of 4% per annum from the 22nd day of May, 1928, until paid, for the further sum of \$230.00, reasonable attorney fees for the collection of plaintiff's note and the foreclosure of plaintiff's mortgage and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements incurred herein.

That plaintiff's mortgage given to secure said note as heretofore described be decreed to be a first and prior lien over all other liens or encumbrances and that the said sums of money above set forth be decreed to be a good, valid and subsisting lien upon the said premises under and by virtue of the said mortgage, upon all of the property heretofore described and as described in plaintiff's mortgage, to-wit:

Commencing one thousand two hundred nineteen and six-tenths (1219.6) feet North of center Section Thirteen (13), Township Four (4), South, Range thirty (30) East of Willamette Meridian County of Union, State of Oregon; thence North three hundred thirty-seven and forty-eight one-hundredths (337.48) feet; thence West two thousand five hundred eighty-one and five-tenths (2581.5) feet; thence South three hundred thirty-seven and forty-eight one-hundredths (337.48) feet; thence East two thousand five hundred eighty-one and five-tenths (2581.5) feet to the place of beginning containing twenty (20) acres, more or less, in the County of Union, State of Oregon.

And that the said mortgage be foreclosed, and that the property therein described be sold as provided by law; that the plaintiff may be a purchaser at said sale; that the proceeds of the said sale, in and to the purchaser of said sale, of the said property be applied to the payment of and to become due upon the promissory note heretofore described, reasonable attorney fees and costs and disbursements of this suit, and accretory costs, and if the proceeds of the said sale are not sufficient to pay the said sums so due the plaintiff, and to become due as aforesaid, then the same to be applied pro rata upon the amount due and to become due the plaintiff; that the sheriff, at the time of the said sale of the mortgaged property, put the purchaser of said property in possession thereof; that the sheriff be directed to execute and deliver to said purchaser, at the time of said sale, a certificate of sale to said property and a sheriff's deed to the same at the expiration of the time allowed by law for the redemption of real property, if no redemption be had.

That the equity of the defendants, Golda B. Murray, G. F. Hall and Percy Little, and all persons claiming under them, in and to said mortgaged property be forever barred and foreclosed of and from all right, title, estate or interest in and to upon said mortgaged property, and every part thereof, saving and excepting only the statutory right of redemption.

That the said mortgage be decreed to be prior in time and superior in right to any right, title or interest, or any claim of any right, title, estate or interest which the defendant, Golda B. Murray, G. F. Hall or Percy Little, or any of them may have or claim to have in or to upon said premises or any part thereof, and that the defendants, each of them and all persons or parties claiming under them, or any of them, may be forever enjoined and debarred from asserting any claim whatsoever in and to the said land and premises adverse to plaintiff, and for such other and further relief as to the Court may seem just and equitable.

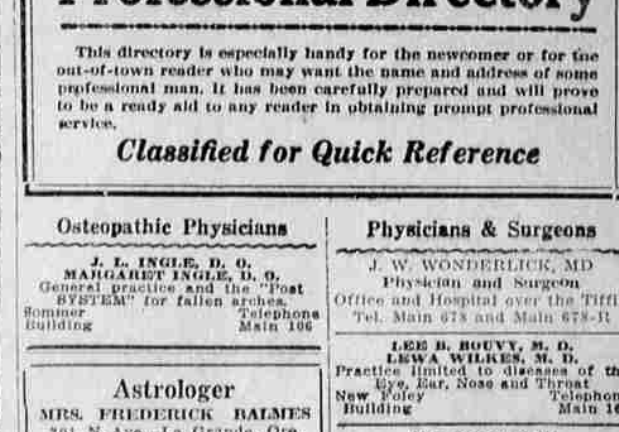
