Industrial Alcohol rose nearly 6 points to the new high of 22 1/2. American Machine & Foundry soared 10 1/2, and Warren Oil stood. International Business Machine and International Combustion Engineering. U. S. Steel recovered most of a 3-point loss and other stocks that had been weak in the early trading came back. #### JAPAN GIVEN CONFERENCE INVITATION

was possible to carry on the talks with a prospective of the future in a broad sense. The two, he added, were searching for those things that would promote a good feeling between the American and British peoples. Great Friendliness Shown Mr. Hoover asserted that more important than the conversations themselves was the reaction of the American people and the great friendliness they had shown to the prime minister and through him to the British people. This evidence, the president said also was more important than any conclusion that he and Mr. MacDonald might reach.

Prime Minister MacDonald and his daughter Isabel took leave today of President and Mrs. Hoover, whose guests they have been since Saturday. From the White House the British statesman and Miss MacDonald returned to the embassy which will be their home until they leave for Philadelphia and New York Thursday en route to Canada. The president and the prime minister parted soon after breakfast. Mr. Hoover went to his office for an early conference with Secretary Stimson regarding the reply to the British invitation to attend the naval limitation conference in London in January.

After reaching the embassy Mr. MacDonald conferred with British officials who accompanied him to the United States and attended to an accumulation of official business. Miss MacDonald drove to the Library of Congress for an inspection of that magnificent building. Before the president and premier separated, however, they had another conference. This took place after breakfast in the study on the second floor, and was a continuation of discussions of the best means of promoting world peace. It was understood they would

have a final talk tomorrow on the eve of the prime minister's departure. While no official indication has yet been given, the expectation is that the president and the British statesman will issue a second joint statement on the general results of the talks upon which they have been engaged since last Saturday.

This morning Mr. Hoover omitted his usual medicine ball game on the south lawn. He and Mr. MacDonald breakfasted at an early hour.

The prime minister in an informal talk with a group of correspondents said he had "never felt better." He thanked the newspaper men for the way they had written about his trip and said their efforts so far had been toward the attainment of complete success for his visit.

### EUNICE PRINGLE TELLS STORY IN PANTAGES TRIAL

she was led from the court room by a police matron at the conclusion of her testimony she burst into hysterical sobs. Under a searching cross examination by defense attorneys, in which an effort was made to elicit intimate details of Miss Pringle's life since last March up to August 5, the witness admitted that she had attended several parties with Nick Dunaway, author of her vaudeville skit, and that on several occasions she had remained out until late hours. She met each defense question in relating to her association with Dunaway, however, by declaring she always was in the presence of other persons. The witness brought out in direct examination that Dunaway at the time was engaged to a girl named Ida May, who was present on nearly every social occasion when he and

Miss Pringle were guests. Shortly after her appearance on the witness stand Monday, defense attorney Geisler began an attack on the court room attire of Miss Pringle. During her appearance at the trial she had been wearing a severely plain dark blue dress with a little white collar; black hose and rather low heeled black shoes. She has worn no powder, rouge or lipstick. "When you went to Pantages' office, didn't you wear a different sort of dress, entirely? Didn't you use dark powder to accentuate your Latin appearance? Didn't you use lipstick?" were among the questions hurled at the girl by Geisler.
