Surgeon Dies Of Gunshot Wounds

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 9 (AP)—Twenty-four hours after he was shot by a demented patient, Dr. Mitchell Langworthy, nationally known orthopedic and plastic surgeon, succumbed yesterday to the wounds. His attacker, John Salami, a laborer, fired a shot into his own brain after wounding Miss Gale Rogers, Langworthy's secretary. He died an hour later.
