LEADS LEADING IN COAST PLAY-OFF

Take Second Straight Game From Hollywood Due to Better Pitching

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10 (AP)—Things looked mighty bad today for the Hollywood Stars in their struggle against the San Francisco Mission Reds for the championship of the Pacific coast league. They were looking for a silver lining in the third game of the post-season play-off series which was scheduled to begin, but the clouds that obscured their chances were quite dark.

So far, the Mission Reds have maintained a strange hold on the lead, defeating the Stars twice in the two opening games of the series. Two defeats in a row in a series of only seven games is a difficult obstacle to overcome, and the Stars know it. When the Reds won the second game by a score of 5 to 6 at Recreation Park yesterday, the Stars saw their pennant chances begin to glimmer. Round the Bay City club win two more straight, the stars would end with the fourth, and the pennant with all the spoils would go to "Red" Killefer's outfit.

Although the two clubs are evenly matched, and their chances were conceded to have been equal, both games won by the Reds were bolstered by superior pitching. Even before the series, it was conceded that the Reds had a slight edge on the pitching side, although Hollywood was said to have held the advantage on hitting.

In yesterday's game Bert Cole pitched for the Missions, and he admitted that the going was anything but easy. He credited the hot work of his team mates with having in a large measure brought the victory.

With Hollerom in the box for Hollywood, the Stars kept pace throughout the most of the game. The balanced left hand in the first inning on Fred Hollinger double and a single by Park. ATHLETICS HOME FOR THIRD GAME

Experts and Cubs Defeated in First Two Contests in Chicago.

By Brian Hill (Associated Press Sports Writer)—CHICAGO, Oct. 10 (AP)—With most of the pro-series dope scrubbed beyond repair, the Cubs and Athletics today moved from Chicago to Philadelphia to resume play tomorrow.

The enthusiasm of the American leaguers as they returned to their home and bedside knew no bounds for they had done all they could at Chicago, winning the only two games played. The Cubs on the other hand were a grim but determined ball club as they left home, not to return unless they can take two of the three games scheduled at Shibe park.

Optimism, however, was rampant among the National league representatives even after the second straight defeat in a contest in which the Athletics never were in the game. A crowd of 49,287 had few chances to cheer.

Strong Comeback Necessary

Even the groundkeepers have tangible proof of their faith in the club. After the A's had dashed laughing from Wrigley field with a 5 to 3 rebuff of the Cubs in their big, workmen took their places on the diamond and with meticulous care placed the playing surface in apple pie order for a baseball game that will not be played this season unless their beloved Cubs can execute a strong

comeback. The Cubs were forced to use four pitchers in the first game, but three a horse run ball to Jimmy King at the home of his mother, when game time arrived tomorrow.

Quinn May Pitch
Old Jack Quinn, the veteran of veterans, probably will get the call from Connie Mack, although the old pitcher, as soon as he is called, can sustain any one of half a dozen pitchers to the mound. The student John Pione was all warmed up yesterday in spite of some of the subject baseball weather of the period. McLain threw almost as many as that of Chicago, and has a "splitter" too.

The first two games of the series have been glorious triumphs for the holding A's, but disastrous defeats for the experts. Before play began the close observers declared that the Cubs would be almost unshakable in their own ball yard and would send in a lineup of seven regulars battering from the right side of the plate to slaughter left-hand pitching.

Geneva Inevitable
The National league champions went to game at home to meet the series and secured no runs against Lefty Grove, as left-handed as any pitcher in the game, in the 4-1-2 innings he pitched when he went to the relief of Barnshaw. The big right-hander was shelled from the hill in the only decisive offensive gesture the Cubs were able to make in two days.

Among the bitter reflections the Cubs took with them on their ride from west to east was a strike out record of some kind. Blunkie forced 12 Cubs in nine third strikes Tuesday, and Wednesday 13 more.

Although this bit of destructive pitching was divided between Barnshaw and Grove, Barnshaw struck out seven in four and two-thirds innings, and Grove loosed six victims in one-third of an inning less.

Foxes Going Strong
The chore of making a world's series here is not yet in order but when the final scheduling is made, Jimmy Foxe probably will be considered. The Maryland boy, for the second time in two days, set the A's out in front with a home run, the second being more productive than the first in that two of his maine robs home with him. At Shibe park the total of Philadelphia home runs for the series is 10. With a crowd smash good for the Cubs. The home run onslaught was enough to win the game.

GAVE WORLD SERIES TICKET TO POLICEMAN

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 (AP)—You could have knocked Policeman William Shea down with a feather yesterday when a long arm reached out, handed him a box seat to the world series ball game, and then disappeared.

Officer Shea was on duty at the exit opposite of the Addison street "T" station. Trains were disgorging passengers and there was a big crowd clicking through. Officer Shea stood there, shouting: "This way to the ball park."

Out of the mass of masculinity whirling through the turnstile the arm came, and a hand shoved the ticket into the policeman's hand. By the time Shea realized what had happened, the unknown Santa Claus had gone. Shea reported at once to Lieut.

LEWIS AGAIN PINS IOWAN TO PORTLAND MAT

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 10 (AP)—Ed (Strangler) Lewis, ex-heavyweight wrestler champion for the second time in three weeks defeated Howard Cantonwine, Iowa, taking two out of three falls here last night. The first fall was one of the fastest on record here, Lewis taking it in 17 seconds with a toe-hold. In doing so, Lewis crossed up everybody, including Cantonwine, who expected him to use his famous headlock. Cantonwine took the second position in 19 minutes, 45 seconds when he spread Lewis' broad shoulders on the mat with a reverse double wristlock. Lewis took the third fall in 3 minutes, 15 seconds when, after Cantonwine was being down with a wristlock, Lewis suddenly smashed him on the chin with the heel of his right hand. Cantonwine went down, partly stunned and Lewis was on him with all his 230 pounds.

McLARNIN IS WINNER OVER SAMMY BAKER

NEW YORK, Oct. 10 (AP)—Jimmy McLarnin has learned that the bigger fellows can fall just as hard as the little ones if they are in the right spot. Jimmy made his debut as a fall-charged welterweight last night and his punch produced the only result against Second Sammie Baker as it did against Jimmy's opponents in three lighter classes. The result was a first round knockout.

It took one minute for McLarnin to establish a firm connection between his right fist and Baker's head. The New York veteran went down for a count of nine only a few seconds later and arose just to take a final blow from Jimmy's right that ended the battle in two minutes of the first round.

Baker did not recover for several minutes after he was counted out. McLarnin tipped the scales at 144 pounds and had to concede only a two pound advantage to his adversary. Shea reported at once to Lieut.

NEW COMBINATION RATES To Be Effective for RURAL CUSTOMERS on OCTOBER TWENTY-FIRST

On October 21st a new rate schedule will go into effect which will enable our rural customers to obtain their lighting, cooking and power service through one meter. The only restriction to this class of service is that the size of any single motor is limited to seven and one-half horsepower.

These rates start at fifteen cents per kilowatt hour (as at present) and drop off in steps until a rate of two cents per kilowatt hour is reached.

As rapidly as possible our rural customers' bills will be analyzed and notification sent to those who will find it to their advantage to take service under the new schedule.

Further changes in existing rural rates will be announced in the near future.
