Butter Market Easier Today; Eggs Are Firm

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 10 (AP)—The butter market was slightly easier today, but no change was made in price.

The egg market continues firm with strictly fresh supplies below the demand.

Fresh meats and poultry prices were unusually weak. Liberal supplies are being received daily.

The demand for turkeys was already under way, weights of 10 pounds or more being especially desired.

Following the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland Market News Service of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Mixed crops, including celery, cauliflower, lettuce, tomatoes, and cabbage, are being loaded in increasing volume. Extensive celery shipments will not materialize for 10 days or 2 weeks yet, however.

"Prices of the Portland wholesale market continue about steady on nearly all commodities. Supplies of cauliflower are heavy and spinach is becoming more plentiful.

"All melons have disappeared from the market except a few Northern Oregon cantaloupes.

"The first crop of California fresh figs is being unloaded, at prices ranging from 19 to 16c per lb."

CLOSING TONE STRONGER IN WALL STREET

NEW YORK, Oct. 10 (AP)—The unexpected increase of nearly 245,000 tons in the September unfilled orders of the United States Steel corporation, announced at noon today, brought a flood of buying orders into the stock market, and sent prices whirling upward as panic stricken "shorts" rushed to cover their commitments. U. S. Steel common ran up 12 1/2 points, and scores of other issues were marked up 3 to 12 points, some of them showing losses in the early trading.

Meanwhile, call money again, dropped from 6 to 5 per cent and time money was in fair supply at 3 1/2 per cent for all maturities.

Some stocks tapered off on profit-taking in advance of the publication of the weekly brokers' loan statement but the general list kept pushing forward with late buying of the coppers and communications issues the feature.

Investment fund extended its gain to 12 points and Western Union to 16. American Telephone soared well above the 300 mark again. The closing tone was strong with total sales approximating 4,100,000 shares.

written over the Sinclair base since shortly before 3 a. m. today.
